



President's Report April 2007

Much of the Council's time at its last meeting was taken up with discussion about the proposed development of North Bank by the Multiplex Corporation. Discussion centred on the issue of proper recognition of the heritage precinct of William Street - I am sure you will all remember the Society's publication Brisbane's Historic North Bank which gives a wonderful pictorial account of the area from Parliament House to the Treasury Casino. The relationship of the Commissariat Store and National Trust House - the former Immigration Depot - to the river is an extremely important one and it is disastrous that the view of these buildings will be obscured from the river if this plan is implemented. Other concerns considered were continued and possibly louder noise from the Expressway and increased traffic along an enlarged Queens Wharf Road which will become one of the major thoroughfares to any new buildings erected over the Further discussion included the occasioned by any future major flooding. A submission expressing these and other concerns has been forwarded to the Minister responsible for Infrastructure. I attended a session held by a member of Multiplex to explain details of the proposal as he tried to allay fears about concerns such as those outlined above. Significant members of the heritage community were at that meeting and all voiced concerns.

Discussions have been held recently with the management of Kidman Company, now the sub-lessees of Nappamerri Station on which lies the Dig Tree Reserve on Cooper Creek. The company is willing to carry on the good work long undertaken by

Stanbroke Pastoral Company and will continue to maintain the reserve and the nearby camping area. One of the long standing responsibilities of the Society as Trustees is to ensure that the Dig Tree is protected and accessible.

It is with sadness that we record the death of Doris Rollason who died in March aged 90 at the Symes Grove Hostel where she had lived for a number of years. She joined the Society in 1959 and became a Life Member. She was elected to a Fellowship of the Society on 26 July 1984 in recognition of her Museum activities. She was often commended in early Bulletins for her care of the museum artefacts and her value as a guide for the collection. She was born in 1916 in a house that still stands on the corner of Kelvin Grove Road and Bancroft Street named after her grandmother's stepbrother, Dr Joseph Bancroft. She left school at 14 and went to work as a finisher in the workshop behind Greddens Women's Store in Queen Street, a ladies' dress shop where she learned great skills with sewing and dressmaking – skills which she put to use for the Society when historical pageants were held at Newstead House in the days when the Society occupied it. On one memorable occasion the Queen visited Newstead House when a Pageant was held and Doris was introduced to her – a great milestone in her life. She was a kindly person, a hard worker and a stalwart of the Society. She was instrumental in developing and expanding the collection. When she retired to the nursing home, her family donated many of the books she had collected during her long life to the Society and these formed the nucleus of the very successful Book Auction held in 2005. The Society was represented at her funeral on 9 March at St Mark's Anglican Church in Newmarket where she had been baptised and where she was married.

In March, as a Queensland delegate on the Federation of Australian Historical Societies, I travelled to Armidale in New South Wales, to attend the presentation of a Fellowship of the Federation to Dr Lionel Gilbert, a great historian and well remembered by many of the students he taught at the Armidale Teachers' College, later at the College of Advanced Education and in the many postgraduate local history courses run by the University of New England.

For those of us who write and wish to publish local history, the Federation of Australian Historical Societies has recently published *Publishing history: A guide for historical societies*, by Helen Doyle and Katya Johanson. It is a practical and very useful little book guiding the reader through the myriad steps in preparing material for publication.

After an extended holiday in England and Europe recently, Stephen Sheaffe has resigned as editor of the Society's *Journal*, a task which he undertook on the death of our previous long-serving editor, John Kerr. The Council expressed their thanks for Stephen's contribution during the last three years. A new editor will be appointed as soon as possible.

The new exhibition at the Museum of Brisbane, 'Adelaide and Ann: from humble beginnings', was launched on 7 March by the Lord Mayor and many of the images used came from our collection. It is wonderful to see the remarkable collection of photographs built up by the Society over many years being used in this way. On 25 February I was a guest of the Queensland Women's Historical Association at the opening at Miegunyah of the FanFair Exhibition and the re-opening of the partly restored Dining Room, a great event for the association in the demanding business of maintaining a grand house of this age. My one speaking engagement for the month was to be the guest speaker at the first history dinner for the year at the Queensland Club. All these are important activities which help to raise the profile of the Society in the community.

Research report

It was interesting to meet a young medical student from England who had arrived in Australia the day before. The first stop on her research trip in Brisbane was the Welsby Library. She was researching Dr Clarkson, the Dunwich Benevolent Asylum and aspects of Queensland Public Health. There were little snippets we could show her and we could point her to various sources in other places in Brisbane. The gathering of material on Dr V McDowall and TM Elliott and their experiments with television has continued. George Elphinstone Dalrymple and John Kent of Maryborough were two separate enquiries while a very interesting time was had by a researcher looking into early pearl cultivation in the Torres Straits and Cape York areas. This involved looking at some of the Jardine collection and the reports of Saville-Kent who was responsible for fisheries. Another visitor sought information on Aboriginal breastplates, particularly of Woondu who rescued people from the wrecked Sovereign, while another

visitor searched through the voluminous cutting book of Captain Wood.

Brooweena - Woocoo Historical Society has obtained a government grant to upgrade catering facilities and improve working conditions at the museum. They also won \$5,000 cash in the Bushell's Tea Competition, sufficient to assist greatly in bringing their photo collection and cataloguing of records up to date. Caboonbah Homestead near Esk has been the focus of a study by archaeologists from University of Queensland. The homestead was constructed around 1890 as the home of Henry Plantagenet Somerset, pastoralist and Member of Parliament. SEQ Water owns the building and it is managed by the Brisbane Valley Historical Society and is heritage listed. The domestic dump has been excavated on field excursions in 2006-2007. BUS TRIP

Settlement on the Stanley and Brisbane rivers


Our bus trip this year will be on the weekend of 19 and 20 May. It will visit historic properties and sites on the Stanley and Upper Brisbane rivers explored by Cunningham, Lockyer, Logan. This area was first settled in 1841.

We travel via Caboolture visit historic stations Durundur (Woodford), Kilcoy (Monta Cassino), Clifton and overnight in Nanango. Dinner will be at the Nanango RSL Club. On Sunday we pass by Cressbrook Station and visit historic sites at Toogoolawah, Caboonbah and Esk. We complete a fantastic weekend by returning to the Commissariat Store via Ipswich. It is expected that costs will be similar to previous trips. Details and a booking form will be included in this issue of the *RHSQ Bulletin*.

The Grey Street Bridge – 75 years old

Officially opened on 30 March 1932 by the Governor, Sir John Goodwin, the Grey Street Bridge was at the time the largest vehicular traffic bridge in the Southern Hemisphere constructed in steel and concrete. Its construction was of the 'through arch' type, being 1634 feet in length with three main arches.

Work commenced on 11 June 1928 with the Datum Block being laid by the Mayor, Alderman W A Jolly. Work was completed in 3½ years by the Queensland firm MR Hornibrook Ltd at a cost of £420,000.



The foundations of the river spans were unique in Australia. Two reinforced concrete piers about 28 feet in diameter at the toe were sunk to a depth of 107 feet below water level, partly under compressed air operations. The compressed air phase of the construction took exactly six months with workers operating 24 hours a day, a noisy inconvenience to local residents.

The south abutment pier was built on two reinforced concrete caissons at a depth of 83ft below high water. The cylinders and caissons were built on artificial sand islands constructed on site – a method. devised by Mr Hornibrook, which was used for the first time, and was later used overseas. The cylinders were sunk by dredging through the sand islands and river bed until they were within a few feet of rock. Airlocks were then fitted to allow workers to go down and manually embed the cylinders before they were filled with concrete. A medical officer was employed by the contractors, and despite the great depths and air pressure at which work was done, no fatal cases of caisson disease occurred nor was anv permanently disabled.

The arch-ribs for each span were made of structural steel with Evans, Deakin & Company Ltd carrying out all the steel work. The spans weighed up to 100 tons each and they were completely encased in reinforced concrete.

The width of the bridge varies from 66 to 80 feet with special provision for tram tracks when required.

At the centre it stands 56 feet 6 inches above low water level, compared to the Victoria Bridge which stands at 38 feet 9 inches. The height of the arches above the deepest foundation is 191 feet.
