'Baby'

In the photograph above, William (Billy) Robertson stands beside 'Baby', in front of the Irvinebank coal bins circa 1913. 'Baby' was the Number 2 locomotive of the Irvinebank Mining Company and was used to transport ore from Irvinebank to the junction with the Chillagoe railway line at Boonmoo. This locomotive was a 0-4-0T German Krauss and weighed seven and a half tons (almost eight tonne). She was named after Isabella, a daughter of John and Margaret Moffat, who financed the tramway.

Economics had forced Moffat to link Irvinebank with the Chillagoe system in 1907. The tramway guaranteed firewood supplies for his Loudoun mill and had the potential for tapping the recently discovered Mount Mulligan coal measures. The mill was smelting tin from the Irvinebank mine and was consuming 100 tons (102 tonnes) of firewood a day at its peak.

As well as William Robertson, Samuel Cameron, William Hudson and Robert Bliss all drove this locomotive, assisted by firemen William Gunther, Bert McTavish, Charles Greaves, Arthur Clarke and George Hynes.

Queensland History News

Archer Point - Two decades ago Mr Lloyd Stumer, a Brisbane meteorologist singled out Archer Point, 15km north of Cooktown as the best location

in Queensland for a wind farm. It is believed that there has been an absence of operational state and national policies to support the sale of sufficient green energy for any wind farm development in Queensland. However the wind farm east of Malanda has been operating since 2000. The consortium planning the Archer Point wind farm propose a 50 to 60 turbine, 120 megawatt wind farm. Deutsche Bank and European renewable energy sector investor, Aktiva Group, and Wind Power Queensland are involved and have obtained state government and Cook Shire Council in principle support. (*Cooktown Local News* 14 May 2008 p.5)

There is already a wind farm in North Queensland. It was established in 2000 with 20 wind turbines on two dairy farms near Ravenshoe. The official opening was on 14 October 2000 which 3000 people attended. Stanwell Company established Windy Hill project, then the largest wind farm in Australia with a capacity of 12 megawatts of electricity at peak capacity. The 70 metre high towers are a tourist attraction in themselves and a car park has been established. The total cost of the towers is \$20 million. (*Tablelands Advertiser* 11 October 2000 p.4 and *Eacham Historical Society Bulletin* No.257, November 2000; *RHSQ Bulletin* February 2001)

Atherton - The National Trust of Queensland is seeking greater independence in managing the Atherton Chinatown tourist attraction which includes the Chinese Temple and the Old Atherton Post Office and Art Gallery. The Trust is negotiating with the Tablelands Regional Council about upgrading toilet facilities and selection of artists to display works. (*Tablelands Advertiser* 18 June 2008 p.8 including photo)

Byerstown Road - Deep Creek - A hotel and Chinese Gardens were established in 1875 as there was semi-permanent water on the road to the Normanby Goldfield and the Palmer Goldfield. In 1880 Ah Ving established a garden, took on a partner, Ah Ching in 1881 and Ah Kain and Ah Yees started another garden that year. Ah Wong and Ah Chong took over Ah Ving's garden but all had ceased by 1883. From 1879 the road to Maytown changed to be the direct Cooktown - Maytown Road. The hotel continued until 1890 by which time the Normanby goldfield had declined. (*Cooktown Local News* 21 May 2008 p.15 including photo of road)

Charters Towers - Aldoborough House was auctioned on site at 25 Deane Street, Charters Towers on 10 May 2008. Louis Hamann acquired the three blocks of land in May 1881 from the Kennedy railway reserve. Alfred Daking Smith then purchased the land in June 1896 and is believed to have built

Aldoborough in 1903. Dr Thomas Edmeades purchased the house in 1919 and conducted a medical practice from it. Jessie Beach bought it in October 1922, having moved from Muttaborra. Several generations of the Beach family have owned and lived in the house. It is thought to have been one of the first houses in Charters Towers to have electricity. It had a 32V generator under the house. Ornate vents in each room's ceiling are ducted through the ceiling to the exterior to provide ventilation. (*North Queensland Register* 1 May 2008 p.12 including four photos)

Childers - The grave of Maria Queen of Childers at Apple Tree Creek was in a special ceremony on 15 March 2008. The Isis District Historical Society Inc provided a special grave marker and plaque. Queen Maria died on 26 March 1917 at an age believed to be well over 70 years. She had been presented with a breast plate by Childers solicitor, J J Butler. Member of the Isis District Historical Society Inc and representatives of the Butchulla People attended the ceremony and the President of the Society, Lyn Smith, and Jenny Woodman of the Butchulla People spoke. The Butchulla People thanked the Isis District Historical Society Inc for providing the recognition. (*Isis Town and Country* 20 March 2008 p.1 including two photos)

Cooktown Botanic Gardens - A draft Management plan for the gardens is to be released for public comment. The reserve for the Botanic Gardens was created in 1878 and stretches from Cherry Bay in the north along the coast to Alligator Creek in the south, along Alligator Creek to Garden and Hogg Streets and back to Cherry Tree Bay. The gardens are heritage listed and include a reconstructed watercourse and original flower beds and pools constructed from 1890. The layout follows the gardenesque style of Europe. Guugu Yimithir people collected fruits and resins. After state government funding ceased in 1917 the area gradually fell into disrepair. Reconstruction began in the 1980s in the newly named Gallop Botanic Reserve. Thirty-five species were identified in the original flower beds by 1990. The area was host to the first scientific collections on the Australian mainland, in 1770. Intended development includes expanding the gardens to a full range of the 160-odd species studied and drawn by Vera Scarth-Johnson, propagating and displaying the complete Banks and Solander collection with signage and walkways, building an orchid greenhouse, improving walkways and tracks around the gardens and the reserve. A research centre for botanists, naturalists and artists is proposed, theatre for cultural, recreational and business events and another exhibition gallery. There will be more

spectator seating and sports clubhouse at Queen's Oval. Trustee leases may be established with sporting groups. (*Cooktown Local News* 21 May 2008 p.8)

Cooktown - Forty locations were identified in May 1993 in stage one of a Cook Shire Council heritage survey of Cooktown. (*Cooktown Local News* 21 May 2008 p.13 quoting the 19 May 1993 edition of that newspaper)

Cooktown's only surviving public hall has been restumped. The \$30,000 renovation was funded by the Environmental Protection Agency Living Buildings and Places Heritage Program and the Cook Shire Council. The 101 year old building is heritage listed. The outside stumps were replaced in similar style stumps and the inner ones are steel. The work was completed in the first two weeks of May. (*Cooktown Local News* 14 May 2008 p.8)

Hopevale - The Lutheran Church has been restored at a cost of \$300,000 (utilising State Government Q150 funding). Many local people worked on the restoration - painting, tiling, fencing, roof repairs and a new gate. On 15 June the church was dedicated. Hundreds of people attended and the choir sang. The church played a significant role in the lives of the Guugu-Yimidhirr People on their return from Woorabinda after World War II. Pastor Rosenfeldt who had been at Woorabinda with the people attended the rededication. (*Cooktown Local News* 18 June 2008 p.8 and 25 June 2008 p.2 - letter to Editor by Jeanette Covacevich, Jensen's Crossing, via Cooktown)

Hughenden - In 1933 an enterprising Longreach stock and station agent suggested that the new Australian 'talkies' directors might visit remote Queensland pastoral stations to shoot the new films. He suggested on property near Hughenden be selected for its similarity to the western American rugged scenes. On that property the windmill was 12 miles from the homestead by a bridle track. There was also a story attached to the property where 3,000 sheep turned out into a 30,000 acre paddock disappeared entirely - perhaps put to profit by an itinerant 'grazier'. (*Longreach Leader* 4 July 2008 p.17 quoting an issue of that newspaper dated 1 July 1933.)

Irvinebank which features through the *Bulletin* cover photo of the locomotive 'Baby', has been a significant mining centre in Australian history. Discovered in 1881, the mines were opened in 1883 by John Moffat who had the Great Northern battery at Herberton; the battery and smelter were christened by Janet Jack as the *Loudoun* Mill on Separation Day, 10 December 1884. Moffat built his home, *Loudoun* house there that year too, and a dam of the same name as well on Gibbs Creek. Moffat's private

company, the Irvinebank Mining Company expanded the mill to treat both company and public ore. The mill became the centre of Moffat's empire extending from Mount Mulligan, Mount Carbine, Wolfram Camp and Mount Molloy in the north, south through Montalbion to Mount Garnet and west through Chillagoe to OK and Cardross to Muldiva, and controlling or influential interests in the majority of the tin mines in the country between. Moffat's Irvinebank Mining Company built the Irvinebank Tramway from Stannary Hills into Irvinebank in 1907. He had already promoted and developed railways to Mount Garnet, Chillagoe and Mungana, and Mount Molloy through the mining and railway companies. The State Government purchased Loudoun Mill in 1919 and ran it as a State Enterprise until 30 June 1983 when it was sold to Mr Frank Hilla. The contract was never completed and the State Treatment Works has been transferred to the Mareeba Shire Council (now Tablelands Regional Shire). Irvinebank State Treatment Works and Loudoun House, and the Irvinebank School of Arts and the Stannary and Irvinebank Tramways are on the State Heritage Register. For very extensive details of John Moffat's career, the Irvinebank mill and mines and Moffat's northern mining empire see the book which the Society sells - *John Moffat of Irvinebank: a biography of a regional entrepreneur and mining history of the Cairns Hinterland* by Ruth S Kerr (296 pages, illustrated, maps, bibliography, index, ISBN 0 9595072 7 2, \$30 plus \$5 postage) and 'Who has the Responsibility? Preservation of Tin Technology at Irvinebank, North Queensland', Paper presented to Third National Conference on Engineering Heritage, 1986, held at Adelaide University, Published in *Proceedings*, pp.10-12. A large collection of records was donated to the Society in the mid 1950s by Gus Waddell.

Malanda - The State Government has allocated \$25,000 in the Budget for 2008-2009 for the preservation of the Majestic Theatre at Malanda. (*Tablelands Advertiser* 11 June 2008 p.8)

Millstream National Park - A one kilometre (45 minutes) walk has been developed through the old World War II parade ground, officers' tents area, mess tent and ablution areas. It was officially opened by the Director General of the Environmental Protection Agency, Mr Terry Wall, in June. \$30,000 has been spent constructing the walk and another \$10,000 is to be spent on signage to explain the historical significance. There were around 100,000 troops in 320 army and ancillary units over 160 sites. Each camp was designed to accommodate 1,000 troops. A Harvard war bird from World War II performed a flyover of the site on the opening day.

Shuttle buses brought people from Ravenshoe for the celebrations. (*North Queensland Register* 26 June 2008 p.15 including three photos)

Mount Amos south of Cooktown - Tin has been mined intermittently in the area since 1887. There was a hotel opened by Henry Clark in 1887 and taken over by Henry Harris in 1890 and operated to 1894. Patrick Archibald is thought to have operated the *Miners Rest* from 1888 to 1890. The main mines were the Owen and Davidson, Hurricane Gully Claim, Davison's Gully Claim, Better Luck Claim (Walk & Hasset), Forest Devil Claim (George & Fred Norris), Phoenician Lode (Vallis Brothers). £13,434 in tin output was obtained from Mount Amos between 1910 and 1914. (*Cooktown Local News* 7 May 2008 p.16 including photo and map)

July research report

Some of the queries this month have been very general and it has been difficult to provide material from our collection. It is important that we get specific questions especially from distant enquirers because we can not do research for them when we are not sure what their focus is. In this category we were asked for any information (Indigenous and European) relating to Bowen, Merinda, Pring and Abbot Point, all located in the area of the Whitsunday Regional Council. We were also asked about Aboriginal representation in Rugby League and the wider social and economic environment of Aborigines in the first half of the 20th century. Both these queries were difficult for us to answer so all we could do was talk to the enquirer and suggest other places where there may be material, but also advised them to be a little more specific. We were also asked about the railway going to Goondiwindi and the South West line for a book to celebrate the centenary of the Railway to Goondiwindi for publication in October 2008. We could refer the enquirer to the Kerr Historical Database which has many references to the moves to extend the rail to Goondiwindi. A family historian was interested in the history of Rowe's Café where one of the family members worked for many years. Research on the timber industry was undertaken for a Museum of Brisbane future exhibition on silky oak. Parliamentary Debates were checked for material on Dickson in September – October 1899.

The Welsby Library has received a collection of photographs and postcards of places visited by a South Australian family on a bus trip to Queensland starting in August 1899.

Northbank (a report by Jean Stewart)

I was pleased to represent the Society as a stakeholder in the Enquiry-By-Design into the North Bank development which was held in June. Fifty stakeholders were invited to attend for three days and were supported by about 20 technical experts. The aim of the exercise was to prepare seven different scenarios which could possibly solve the problem of improving the North Bank area. Seven different groups worked for three days examining all kinds of ways to develop the area within the original terms of the brief prepared by the Government, the main one being that there should be development of the narrow site at no cost to the Government. Issues such as flooding, the limitations presented by the Expressway and the cost of necessary infrastructure were all examined. At the end of the three days seven different designs were presented and will be given to the Government for consideration so that in the long term some changes can be made to this important part of the city to make it attractive and interesting and, above all, safe for people to have access to the river. It was a stimulating experience and wonderful to see so many people working very hard and very co-operatively on the task. It was heartening to see that all the designs emphasised the importance of the heritage precinct and nearly all focused their designs to celebrate the Birthplace of Brisbane and Queensland.
