EXHIBITION INCORPORATING MISSION AUSTRALIA'S 150th ANNIVERSARY

The exhibition celebrates the well-respected organisation of Mission Australia turning 150 years old. Artefacts on display include a chalice belonging to Chaplain G Innes Ritter from 1944, a corporate seal of 1902, collection boxes from the 1950s and beautifully restored antique dolls from the 1960 Doll Show. A souvenir publication of the Celebration Gala Dinner from 1960, a poster, marketing material, and Mission magazines covering 1940 to 1990 are also on display. Wonderful photographs showing the various services performed by volunteers working at the mission combine to give a superb display.

Among his many initiatives are the changes made to the *Journal*, now the *Queensland History Journal*, in its smart new livery thanks to the help of Dr Michael Tracey; the *Bulletin* is now enjoyed

online by many members resulting in a definite financial saving; and the attractive signage at the Commissariat Store is a visible reminder of just how much Denver has done to promote the Society, and particularly in local cultural circles. One of his last duties was to bestow an Honorary MacGregor Medal on the retiring Manager and Curator of the Museum, Allan Bell.

We wish Allan and Elizabeth long and happy lives with their family in Townsville. The farewell party at the Commissariat Store was a lot of fun, full of good cheer and anecdotes, and we are glad to welcome Allan among new members of the Society.

Meanwhile it is business as usual and we are glad to have Katy Law as Acting Manager. Katy is the newest member of Council. Elsewhere in the *Bulletin* you will see that we are calling for expressions of interest for the position of Manager, and also for the vacant seat on the Council, Dr Lesley Williams and Andrew Darbyshire not having sought re-election. Both Lesley and Andrew have been constant supporters and we thank them and look forward to seeing them at talks and functions on a regular basis.

Our lecture program has brought many historians and their friends together. A large gathering for the AGM in August enjoyed the Clem Lack Oration presented by Emeritus Professor Kay Saunders, and as with so many of our lectures I look forward to seeing it appear in due course in our *Journal* where it can be mulled over carefully. The Wednesday lecture by Judith Marks was a wonderful opportunity to view photographic images of the Marks, Drury and also Dods families and the places that interested them, and to enjoy lively debate about the significance of many of them. How wonderful to have these old glass plate negatives retrieved and presented so clearly.

The forthcoming lectures will undoubtedly continue this high standard, with very well-known speakers: Professor Peter Spearritt and the Queensland Historical Atlas; in October Robyn Buchanan talks about Ipswich up to 1859, and then four historians will tell us how four religions, Anglican, Catholic, Presbyterian and Baptist, ministered to Queenslanders, and others. A lively joint question time will follow, surely. Do come to some of these if you can, and of course we welcome friends and non-members.

I am learning more and more about the works being done on behalf of the Society, whether it is work on the collection itself, or the care of our visitors, or the preparation of displays. The current Mission Australia display maintains this high standard, and, though small, is delighting visitors.

The Society looks forward to hosting the AGM of the Federation of Australian Historical Societies in October and a very full weekend of activities is planned including a tour of the newly-refurbished Old Government House and visits to various parts of the Cultural Centre.

I hope you continue to enjoy the *Bulletin* - in the August issue I was saddened to read of the death of a distant cousin, Brian Philpott, but I was also reminded that his forebears, Monica Connolly and James Philpott, were married in Gayndah in November 1858 by Archbishop Polding, who as the Archbishop of Sydney was visiting his northern flock, just before Separation and just before the formation of the Catholic Diocese of Brisbane. The *Bulletin* is a mine of information.

Queensland History News

Beaudesert - The Historical Society of Beaudesert has commenced indexing the local newspaper the

Beaudesert Times, first from 1899, when it was called the Beaudesert Despatch and from September 2007. The early indexing will make accessible the microfilm collection held at the Beaudesert Public Library, and will fill a gap in the Society's archival cuttings collection, which is from about 1970, after the Society was created. Charleville – A new Cobb & Co coach factory was opened soon after the destruction of the original one by fire on 25 October 1897. Details were featured in the *Western Times* on 14 August 2008 and a photograph was published. The new building was 17 X 11.5 metres including workshops for painters and trimmers. A second wing 28 X 17 metres housed blacksmiths and wheelwrights. The paper listed employees: Tom Gallagher (manager); Cecil Search (road manager); Hoopers; Doug Boyce, Robert Boyce and Bob McWha. Drivers were listed as 'Cracker' Jack Larkins, Andy Atkins, Billy Mitchell, Ted Donoghue, Joe Mosch, Dave Sinclair, Sam Ruxton, A Wicks and J Coyne.

Coen – An extract from Police records in the 1920s and held in the Police Museum was published in the *Cooktown Local News* on 20 August 2008 regarding the arrest by Francis Johnson of three Aboriginals in relation to the disappearance of sandalwood getter, Frederich Heineman of Coen. Heineman's body had not been found but some of his possessions had been found in the possession of the three Aboriginals. A mounted patrol had proceeded 100 miles from Coen into the Archer River area to locate the Aboriginals who were in a camp of 300. Mr Geoff Wharton presented a paper at the Professional Historians Association (Queensland) on 4 September 2009 in Brisbane on the history of the sandalwood industry in Cape York.

Cooktown - There is local uncertainty as to why Mrs Elizabeth Cooper, aged 28 years, was buried some distance from what is the main part of the Cooktown cemetery today. She and Mrs Charles Siebold and Thomas Graham were also buried in the cemetery at the same time after the same accident in August 1874 after the capsize of the Platypus cutter on a pleasure cruise in the Endeavour River. Others on the cutter were: George Cooper, Charles Siebold, Charles Siebold seven years, Louis Demetrius (hairdresser), Percy C Fuller (farmer at Marton later), Roger an Italian, Marco Songa (part owner of the Platypus), Francis Seymour (a Manilla seaman), and two men (names unknown). The boat capsized off St Patrick's Point. Mrs Siebold had advertised a week earlier that she intended to commence a school in Cooktown. Mrs Cooper and Mrs Siebold were buried the day after the tragedy and an inquest was held that day as well. When the two women were buried the land for the Cooktown cemetery had not been gazetted. At the time a road ran along behind Mrs Cooper's grave near where mango trees are today. It is likely that Mrs Siebold and George Thomas are buried nearby. Gympie - Lt Gilbert Harry who served at Gallipoli and won the Military Medal at Pozieres and the Military Cross and Bar at Yypres in World War I is buried in Gympie Cemetery. Mr Gary Parsons has undertaken research of his career. Harry was born in the Channel Islands and migrated to Australia. His AIF brigade was gassed at Pozieres. He was an Intelligence Officer at Ypres. In later life he was a dairy farmer at Kanyan near Theebine. He died without family of an acute respiratory illness. (*Gympie Times* 1 April 2009 p.3 including photo of Gympie RSL Sub Branch President Ivan Friske at Harry's grave in the cemetery)
