



President's Report January 2010

A Happy New Year! And a busy one and you will see from the various notices in this *Bulletin* that there is a lot planned already. It is good to carry on the momentum of the 150-year celebrations and to build on the many friendships formed and reformed through the many activities in which we

took part. Perhaps one of the nicest was the evening of Separation Day itself when many of us gathered at, and around, Newstead House, buying books, listening to the band and seeing the Separation flag lowered at dusk.

The Society ended 2009 with another windfall of grant money, this time from the

Gambling Community Benefit Fund. They gave us \$32,912.00 including GST for the restoration of books in the Welsby Library. Grants Co-ordinator Dr Rebecca Ling applied for money to restore large numbers of the Votes and Proceedings, Government Gazettes and Hansards. These are the only sets available to researchers in hard copy and our thanks are due to Grace Grace MP & Cr Jane Prentice who supported our application. The panoramic photographs are away being conserved as a result of the earlier grant.

Editor Dr Margaret Kowald and her team have just sent the fourth of the sesqui-centenary Queensland History Journals away for publication and you will receive it shortly. The publication of so many conference papers in such a short time has been an heroic effort on their part, and the Society is grateful to them, as it is to all those who prepare these significant pieces of research.

There will be another conference in May, this time at Parliament House, as it celebrates the first meeting of the Queensland Parliament. More details will appear on the website as they are finalised with the rest of the lecture program by Senior Vice-President Manfred Cross and the program committee.

I remind you that it is time for nominations for the John Douglas Kerr Medal of Distinction, awarded by the Society on Queensland Day since 2005, and once again, details are on our website. This year the Queensland Day Dinner will be held on the eve of the holiday, on the Saturday night and I hope to see many of you then, as always.

If you have not already done so, please consider registering for the February Workshop so that you can contribute to our forward plans for the Society. It is after all your Society and we welcome your suggestions for change. Just one example is the wide variety of backgrounds of visitors to the Commissariat Store – brochures in various languages are being prepared to make their visits even more worthwhile.

Come in to see the Thomas Welsby Exhibition – 'Recognition at Last'. At last he really is 'showcased' in a fitting manner. Many Society members work hard on the various aspects of our collection. Just one is Marilyn England who has painstakingly compiled a database of the artworks. Queensland History News

Charters Towers – The Charters Towers and Dalrymple Family History Society (Ph 07 4787 4843) is seeking details about architect, Christian Frederick Mouritzen, who was reputed to have worked in Charters Towers from around 1884. He came from Denmark and later went to Croydon where he established a sawmill. Mouritzen later moved to Western Australia where he held the licence of the Federal and Perth Hotels. (*Northern Miner* 1 January 2010 p.4 including photo)

Cooroy - The Lower Mill Site was listed on the Queensland Heritage Register in April 2009 for its mid twentieth century saw mill technology. The boiler room, drying kiln (built in 1956), chimney and surviving machinery are listed. The heritage significance of the site was recognised in the Noosa Shire Council Heritage Study in 2001. The site was awarded the 2009 Australian Institute Landscape Architect Oueensland Landscape Architecture Award in the Land Management Category. The award took account of community consultation and sympathy to the heritage of the site. The first stage at the site has been restoration and contemporary reuse of the sawmill buildings. The Cooroy remaining Woodworkers Club are using the boiler room area. The Shire's hinterland library is also being constructed on the Lower Mill Site. (Cooroy Rag 14 October 2009 p.5)

Dalrymple Town Site – The Queensland Heritage Council has decided not to enter the Dalrymple town site on the western side of the Burdekin River on the Queensland Heritage Register. Dalrymple was surveyed in 1864 and was the first inland town in north Queensland. It is situated immediately north of the Basalt Wall. It was on the road from Townsville westwards to the pastoral stations being established in Gulf Country. (*Northern Miner* 1 January 2010 p.4)

Donnybrook Blocks Battery and Township (Middle Camp) on Ravenswood Goldfield in Nineteenth Century - The Queensland Heritage Council has decided not to enter the Donnybrook Blocks Battery and Township (Middle Camp) on the Queensland Heritage Register. Buchanan, Jessop and Connelly founded it. The Charters Towers Regional Council has recently been advised on the decision. (Northern Miner 1 January 2010 p.4)

Julia Creek – The McKinlay Shire Visitor and Information Centre, At The Creek, was opened by the Premier on 11 December 2009 Recycled Police and Railway buildings were used as the major structures which display the historical themes of water, country and people of the district. There are six audio tracks outside explaining the history. The theatrette in the Police Gaol Cell seats 15 people. (North Queensland Register 17 December 2009 p.13)

Library Report

Two interesting new items by Murray Johnson and Kay Saunders added to the collection are Wild heart, bountiful land: An historical overview of the Mary River Valley and Working the land: An historical overview of Boonah and its northern district, these were commissioned by Queensland State Archives and donated by QSA. Photographer volunteer Doug Lochhead has donated Historical photographic collection, which has over 550 digital images with Henry William Mobsby of the Department of Agriculture and Stock responsible for 412 of them. John Steele's Brisbane River and Brisbane Town photos were catalogued by Doug Lochhead and have been added to the catalogue. Doug has donated another CD storage container and cleverly clearly marked the rows and columns to help locate each CD or DVD.

Noel Wallis has donated Richlands, Inala and Suburbs History Group's publication 'Dr Stephen Simpson (1792-1869) MD, JP, MLC: Woogaroo Station 1843-1852'; Jeff Hopkins-Weise donated his recent book Blood brothers: The Anzac genesis; National Biographic have donated review copies of John Murdoch's new political history books Folly. fortune, fate: The demise and the rebirth of the right in the early Federal Parliament Vols 1 and 2. These two books include essays on federal politicians and political issues before and after 1917. Judy Masters donated a signed copy of Barry Allan's Updated edition: Sophia Grantham also known as Kezia Tregilgus; Joy Loggie donated a copy of her book Mowbraytown heritage: A walk in yesteryear. Ian Hadwen donated a steady storm of correspondence: Selected letters of Gwen Harwood 1943-1995 and The Land Act, 1897 and regulations thereunder (including timber regulations).

Added to the archives collection is a ticket to the Historical Society of Queensland Brisbane centenary event on 3 December 1923. A listing of illustrations in Queensland calling, Teleradio, a weekly wireless journal from vol. 1, no 1, 3 May to 1933 to vol 5, 20 March 1937 was added to the Radio and television subject file. Information about articles in the Sesquicentenary Journal No 2 was added to the catalogue.

More of Lyndsay Smith's digital images added to the catalogue. Doug Lochhead has gone through JG Steele's 59 photos for his book *Brisbane Town in convict days 1824-1842*, originally published by the University of Queensland Press in 1975, analysed them and provided me with a spread sheet giving me the RHSQ photo number, title, notes, subject headings etc. These photos have been added to the Welsby Library database.

I apologise to Nancy Tow for not previously noting her generous donations of booklets on Cooran, Pomona and other Sunshine Coast places, and Nancy's recent donations of relevant history cuttings from the Nambour Weekly. A new subject file Queensland sesquicentenary, Q150, has been created. If anyone has any interesting cuttings or information that could be added to this file, it would be very much appreciated.

Bob Forsyth of Mt Isa has donated three CDs of downloaded material, mainly articles from the Royal Geographical Society (of London), many of the pdf articles relate to explorations and discoveries and added to the catalogue *Caloundra poems* by Eric Williamson. Ruth Kerr has donated a heap of newspaper cuttings and other items; this will keep me busy for a couple of weeks.

Triple-miracle novel

It's a miracle that it was written at all, let alone preserved, then re-discovered, relatively recently. Part of Rod Fisher's 'Signs Separation' exhibition last year, Tom Hurstbourne or a Squatter's Life is an unpublished 1864-65 manuscript of a novel set in Central Queensland, penned by a 27-year-old Shropshire. Lively, intriguing entertaining, the story offers valuable insights into life on Queensland's colonial frontier. Jointly published by Boolarong Press and the Brisbane History Group, retired High Court Justice and author, Ian Callinan AC QC, will pronounce judgement on the book at its launch on 28 February 2010 at the Mercy Heritage Centre, Fortitude Valley.
