The Commissariat Store Norfolk Island

This building on Norfolk Island was built for the same purposes as the Commissariat Store in Brisbane. Although this is not part of Queensland history I have included this photo, as I am sure that members will be interested to know that there is another colonial Commissariat building that is still in an excellent state of repair.

The building was constructed under the supervision of Major Joseph Anderson, the seventh Commandant of the Second Settlement. Construction began in February 1835 and the building was ready for occupation by September of the same year.

The Commissariat store consisted of three floors and a basement (now the Archaeological Museum). The basement originally housed the liquor and general stores. In 1845 the basement was converted to an issue office. The first floor contained the main office, a meal room and store. The second floor was the engineer's office, store and a grain store. The third floor was for grain storage, goods being hoisted up and transferred in and out of these floors through gantries on the northern wall.

hardworking editorial team with material for the Queensland History Journal, but also those Wednesdays and Thursdays are a chance to meet others who are concerned with our history, and give good opportunities for discussion. Our conference this year is in May to celebrate the first Queensland Parliament.

It is 150 years this year since Burke and Wills and the rest of the party set out from Melbourne. RHSQ as a custodian of the famous Dig Tree out near Innamincka is planning wavs to commemorate the trip. The search parties that went out to look for the lost travellers sent back glowing reports of the vast pastoral lands they traversed, and it was not long before the pastoralists followed them. What started out as the Exploring Expedition became Victorian an integral part of Queensland's history.

Another grant has been received, this time \$32,912 from the Gambling Community Benefit Fund. Brisbane bookbinder Roger Perry has now started work on restoration of many of the leatherbound volumes in The Welsby Library. Soon many of the Votes & Proceedings, Government Gazettes and Hansards will be back on the shelves ready for research and reference, the only hard copy sets available to historians. Microfilm is good, and particularly for printouts, but the volumes are much easier to peruse.

As I write I am looking forward to our workshop, which will be facilitated by Kathleen Singleton, due to the unavoidable absence of John Mills. Kathleen has been working with the Futures Committee and I feel confident that soon we will have more ideas about what we want for the future of the Society.

The Fortitude Club is no longer, but we congratulate them on their long existence, and thank them for their generosity in including RHSQ as they finally disbursed their funds. Those who came on the *Fortitude*, and in turn their descendants, have been of immeasurable benefit to this part of the world.

When you are noting up your diaries do note that the Queensland Day Dinner will be on the eve of the holiday, on Saturday 5 June. It is an event many look forward to and I am grateful to our generous friends at Runcorn, Queensland State Archives, who yet again will sponsor it, and next year as well. Architect Don Watson used many images from QSA for his fascinating talk about the other side of Brisbane's Northbank; a reminder of just how much is available there. And on the subject of archives, your Society is working hard on your behalf through the Federation of Australian Historical Societies to ensure that National Archives retains its offices throughout Australia.

Please ask to receive your Bulletin by email if you can; in that way we can elaborate more about what is happening while keeping costs down. The Queensland History Journal will remain in hard copy, now with some colour images. I remind you that the RHSQ catalogue is available on disk, and updated regularly so you know just what records are available. Happy research and reading!

## **Queensland History News**

(Collected by Ruth Kerr from personal Queensland contacts, Affiliated Societies and Newspapers)

**Biggenden** – A photograph of the Biggenden town in 1902, taken from Hospital Hill, appeared in the *Central and North Burnett Times* on 21 January 2010 at page 2. It shows the hotel, railway station and houses. The railway had opened on 13 April 1891.

**Bloomfield** – The Cooktown and District Historical Society published a short history of Olufson's sawmill 8 km upstream from the mouth of the Bloomfield River in the early 1900s. In the 1930s they had a contract towing rafts of red cedar logs to Cooktown. In the early 1940s they also established vegetable gardens to supply the American soldiers stationed in the area. **Brooweena** – Each year since 1990 the Woocoo Historical Society organises the over 60s reunion on 1st October of past and present residents of the original Woocoo Shire Division One. In 2009 the 1933 International Truck restored by Mr David Berthelsen of Gayndah was on display. David Berthelsen is a dedicated machinery restorer at Gayndah Historical Society. Cynthia, his wife, and he have been office bearers in the Gayndah and been members of this Society for many years. The International Truck originally belonged to Mr Tal Lahey who used it at his Brooweena sawmill established in 1924. Also of special interest on the day were the new murals painted on the inside of the walls of the closed in verandah area of the CWA building at the museum complex. The larger mural is a collage of photographs of the early settlement of the Woocoo Shire. The smaller mural about the Mount Joseph Memorial Bridge has the poem about the bridge written by Gordon J Cook who worked at nearby Mount Joseph Station. Mr Warren Persal sponsored the acquisition of the murals. Members of his family had worked bullock teams in the shire and attended the local school. **Cooktown** – The Cooktown Anglican Church has been sold and removed to a property on Oakey Creek Road. The original church, Christ Church, was built in 1874. It was destroyed in a cyclone in 1949 and reconstructed using the materials of the old church. The daughter of real estate agent Barbara Hay's partner, John, will now use it as a home. A new Anglican church is to be built in Cooktown. (*Cooktown Local News* 23 December 2009 p.5 including two photos)

**Irvinebank** – The Mareeba Historical Society presents a significant historical north Queensland figure in the *Tableland Advertiser*. On 27 May 2009 (page 16) it was John Moffat who was the base metal mining magnate of the north. The photograph of Moffat used to illustrate the article is the one taken in Glasgow on his return trip there in 1883.

**Portland Roads and Iron Range, Cape York** - A story of the cook, `Black Jack', at the military depot at Iron range is told in the book, *Jungle Outpost,* by Walter Battisson and was recounted in the *Cooktown Local News* of 29 April 2009 on page 14. A photograph also appears of the jetty at Portland Road showing ships and military vehicles.

## **Exhibition Curator's Report**

With the New Year under way and the Thomas Welsby exhibition creating lots of interest the museum now has two more exhibitions that have been redesigned.

First, the Moreton Bay Penal Settlement display which features objects such as the Cat-o'nine tails, Leg Irons, Convict Cap and Bricks from the penal settlement days. This exhibition complements the building, which was built in 1829 by convict labour.

Second, the HM Penal Establishment St Helena display has now been extended adding for the first time a model of the St Helena Sugar Mill that will be on display for the first time since the reopening of the museum in 2001. Thanks go to Don Murray for his efforts on this project. This exhibition also features the 'Convict Finger', Straightjacket, Island Code and implements made by the prisoners in attempts to escape. St Helena was a prison from 1867 when the Brisbane gaols became overcrowded. The prison closed in 1932. Don't miss the chance to see these exhibitions, which will be on display for 2010.
