Those who took part in the workshop completed a survey beforehand, and this in itself has given us many ideas to work with. At the workshop just about every aspect of the Society was examined and now we have started to put the suggestions into practice, especially those that do not involve great expense. All the time people are beavering away in all the different areas of the Society and among them is Ian Simmonds who for years has been restoring our Queensland Government Gazettes. Many of these large, leather-bound volumes were falling to pieces and virtually unusable and he has transformed whole shelves of them, with a great deal of attention to making them look good as well. And now thanks to grant money obtained Roger Perry is working wonders on more of these colonial records. A reminder: te Welsby Library is open for reading and research every Thursday.

Members of the Museum Committee have also been looking closely at material suitable for exhibition and more items have found their way into The Commissariat Store. Further restoration to the framed art works by Graeme Nicholson saw *Merthyr* and other subjects on display at the Wednesday lecture. And thanks to Andrew Darbyshire and Hon. Librarian Judy Rechner a great deal more material is now available on our website. This of course includes the lecture program with some significant anniversaries being documented this year, such as The University of Queensland, and Fernberg.

RHSQ will celebrate its own centenary in 2013, and is fairly young compared to the Royal Geographical Society of Queensland that has just celebrated 125 years and I know some of you are members of both. I was welcomed to their special lecture evening by President Ken Granger and Secretary Keith Smith and found our two groups have much in common. Queensland History News

Calgoa Copper Mines in South Burnett Region – The identity of the lone grave at the Calgoa Copper Mines has been solved by the Turner family. The grave is of Catherine Holcroft born in Lancashire, England. She died on 25 December 1908 aged 88 years. She was the mother of Mary Ann Turner. A recent fire has burnt the area except for the grave. There appear to be no remains of the mines. (Woocoo Historical Society News Bulletin, Vol.24 No.1, March 2010, page 3)

Condamine – The Condamine Bell was invented by blacksmith, Samuel Williams Jones of Condamine, for a drover for his stock horse. It was made from a discarded pit-saw blade and hung outside the blacksmith's shop until his return. Bullockies saw it and requested similar bells. Samuel Williams Jones' name has been inscribed in the Honour Roll of Unsung Heroes of the Outback at the Stockman's Hall of Fame at Longreach. A large Condamine Bell was unveiled in a Condamine Park by Jones' grand daughter, Emily Sapsford, on 17 September 1977. That bell was made by Mr Hugh Tilly of Condamine. Cooktown & Port Douglas – A letter by a Cooktown priest, Rev Albert Cornelius Mosley of Christ Church, to his sister, Mary Ann (Polly), Jury in Ireland on 27 February 1883, has been chosen by judges including Director-General of National Archives of Australia, **Professor** Geoffrey Bolton, and Professor Geoffrey Blainey, as one of the '200 Letters of a Nation', part of Australia Post's celebration of its history. The letter was submitted by a person from Rockingham in Western Australia. Mosley wrote of Cooktown: 'Really it is a corking place and well deserves the name of Cook, if not after the discoverer, after the heat.' Their new home at Cooktown was 'surprisingly comfortable' – with four large rooms, a verandah on three sides, kitchen and servants' room, bath and storeroom and `a very nice garden with many good fruit trees' (guava, custard apple, orange and lemon). Moseley said `It is much more comfortable than the house at Port Douglas and my work much more pleasant as I have no long journeys to take. I have never complained to the Bishop of the extent of my late district and the unpleasantness, which I had to encounter, but when I took him through my district he saw for himself and said that he had no idea. He has written me several letters since, expressing his pleasure at my having accepted this Incumbency and saying that all the advantage that I now had, I had deservedly merited on account of my work in the Diocese.'

Moseley had completed building St Andrew's Church in Wharf Street, Port Douglas (demolished in 1980s for a resort) which the Bishop was 'most pleased with' when opening it on 27 August 1881. 'The church here (Cooktown) is not to be compared but I am having a few alterations which will add greatly to the Church both as far as appearance and comfort go. My services are well attended. The

Society is much better here than in Port Douglas and the people are most kind, as the Dr said the other day to Minna [his wife], they would make you drunk with kindness ... he hoped to visit the Old Country again ... 'but not in the winter nor during November fogs. That is one thing we do not get out here ... it is well termed Sunny Queensland.' (*Cooktown Local News* 23 December 2009 p.5 including photo of Moseley)

Dimbulah's CWA building was previously the maternity ward at the Mount Mulligan Hospital. It was moved into Dimbulah on 8 July 1959. Because of its association with Mount Mulligan the Dimbulah CWA prepared a display on the Mount Mulligan coal mine disaster in 1921 for the 50th year jubilee of the building in Dimbulah. The building has also been used as a church and for weddings. (*Tablelands Advertiser* 20 May 2009 p.4 including photo)

Gympie – The Rotunda, on the Council heritage list, has been vandalised and needs upgrading. Councillor Larry Friske suggested steel railings to replace wooden railings. The rotunda was built in 1920 as a memorial to local men who fought in World War I. (*Gympie Times* 21 May 2009 pp1 and 2 including two photos)

Gympie – The Gympie Gold Mining and Historical Society Museum has been collecting photographs and letters regarding the No.1 Scottish Gympie Gold Mine and its foundations of which they are doing an interpretative study. The society obtained funding for the purpose under the Commonwealth Government Jobs Fund. (*Gympie Times* 26 May 2009 p.9 including a historical and a modern photograph of the site.)

Manly - The Minister for Natural Resources, Hon Stephen Robertson MP, has called for suggestions for the geographical names for various places. The Friends of Tingalpa Cemetery Heritage Group Inc suggested that the waters between Darling and Norfolk Points be named Arnold Cove as a tribute to the Arnold family who bought Wyvernleigh a 250-acre estate in the Parish of Tingalpa in 1868 from the Leuthwaite estate. Joseph Leuthwaite had built Tingalpa house for Thomas Jones of Barambah north of present day Goomeri, and had married Mary Arnold in 1868. The Arnolds grew into a very extended family of the Manly – Tingalpa area and some are buried in the Christ Church cemetery. They subdivided some of their land for the Manly Beach Estate in 1882. There have been objections to the use of the name Rose Bay for the unnamed tidal cove between Darling and Norfolk Points and The Friends of Tingalpa Cemetery Heritage Group Inc

are campaigning to have it named Arnold Cove. The Friends can be contacted through email: jackiebutler@optusnet.com.au

A book is to be published on the history of the Arnold family – Manly's Forgotten Founders – the Arnolds of Wyvernleigh. (The Friends of Tingalpa Cemetery Heritage Group Inc Newsletter No.22, February 2010, pp.1 and 3)

Mungindi – Balonne Shire Council agreed to become the trustee of the One Ton Post survey peg, 5km west of Mungindi on the banks of Barwon River on 29th parallel. It is said to be the largest wooden survey peg in Australia. It was placed there by surveyor John Cameron in 1881. Funding arrangements were being made by the Mungindi Progress Assciation and the Shire Council with the Community Memorials Program and the state government. Mungindi Historical Society pledged \$5,000, the Progress Association \$2,000 and the Queensland and New South Wales Surveyors' Boards \$2,500. Woolooga – A brief history of the Woolooga cattle saleyards has been published in the Gympie Times. The first sale yards were in the back of the Woolooga Hotel in 1917 and operated until 1925. The Queensland Livestock Company owned by Attie Sullivan, Dinny Gerard, Bill Bishop and Percy Bishop built new yards on the present site in 1949. There were a number of ownership changes thereafter and in 1973 BBC bought five acres for sale of steers. After the price slump in 1974 to 1978 they bought the whole yard from Elders. It was expanded to hold more than 2,000 head. BBC sold the yards in 1984. However it closed in the 1990s. The yards were re-opened in May 2009 when Dan Sullivan bought the yards. Long term auctioneers, Bill Bishop and Jim Connolly, attended the re-opening of the Woolooga Saleyards in May 2009. New Queensland History Books

Caging Octupuses – a tale of the first decade of Condamine Cods Rugby by Annabelle Brayley – published in November 2009 with 350 people attending in Condamine. A description of the club and its achievements, led by Lee McNicholl,

appeared in the *Courier-Mail* on 11-12 November 2009 p.114 including photo.

Herberton: Town of the Pioneers by Glenville Pike OAM, FRHSQ, FRGS (member of the Society since 1948). It was published by Herberton historic Village and is only available for sale there. It was launched in early March 2010. The 80-page book is Glenville's 28th book.

March Research Report

We have recently noticed that we have been generously acknowledged in a number of publications to which we have contributed, and for: All for Queensland by Peter and Sheila Forrest; Recollections on New Farm by Gerard Benjamin and Gloria Grant, Pelletier: the forgotten castaway of Cape York, by Stephanie Anderson and A Place in History, Queensland Turf Club by Helen Coughlan and Noel Pascoe. We have received information that our collection on Dr Val McDowall, researched and enhanced by member Russell Nunn, has contributed to the naming in August 2007 by the Brisbane City Council of some parkland at Streisand Drive, McDowall as 'Dr Valentine McDowall Park'. We are also aware that there are several books in the pipeline to which we have made a contribution.

During the last month the Research team has been working on the Book Auction Catalogue (auction now to be held in July), reviewing the serials and cutting book collections, checking contents of the Plan Drawer, and cataloguing and selling photographic images. We are grateful for the large donation of books from Margaret Kowald – some have been placed in the library collection, some have been held over for a future auction and some have been placed on the For Sale table near reception.

As well as that we have had many enquiries this month: image of the Convict Barracks; AE Moore; North Queensland weeds especially savannah; Walter and Eliza Hall Trust; Captain Logan and his use of the lash; the importation of walers [horses from New South Wales] to Hong Kong from the 1930s to 1960s by FA Woods of Toowoomba; Woolloongabba history; Brisbane before European settlement; lists of householders from the 1931 Street Directory for Kalinga and Albion; McDonnell & East; the place where the Inquiry into Miners' Health was held in Chilligoe; William & Marion Scott, passengers on the Artemesia; and SS Walrus; Wacol Immigration Depot, 1961-65; the Bancroft Family; and Ponsonby John Lucas It looks a great list, but our collection did not provide much help so any

information from members would be welcomed by the enquirers.

Our sets of the Queensland Legislative Assembly Votes and Proceedings, Queensland Reports, Queensland Parliamentary Debates, and Queensland Government Gazettes cover Queensland's entire colonial period. The Society holds the only hard copies on open access, apart from those at the Fryer Library, as the State Library provides microform only. Naturally, researchers prefer to use hard copy wherever possible, but over the years these volumes have suffered considerable wear and tear.

Recent funding from the Gambling Community Benefit Fund has enabled us to start restoring the *Votes and Proceedings*, the *Reports*, and the *Parliamentary Debates*, so that we can continue to provide full access.


We are also indebted to Mr Ian Simmonds, who began some years ago to restore the *Queensland Government Gazettes*, quietly removing a few volumes at a time and just as quietly bringing them back to us, transformed. Despite the extreme deterioration of the bindings as he found them, Mr Simmonds has succeeded in salvaging much of the lettering on the spines

and integrating this original material into secure new bindings. To date he has restored 62 volumes! Without his timely intervention, some of these would literally have fallen apart. This is a labour of love for Mr Simmonds, a member of the Society since 1994, and a keen supporter of our lectures programme. We would like Mr Simmonds to know how highly we value his sustained contribution.

The love of Queensland and its history, which brings us together, enables us to meet some truly generous people.
