# **OUR NEW TEMPORARY HOME AT THE MANSIONS**

The photos on the cover page show a view of The Mansions at the top. Below left is a photo of one of the cats that decorate the George Street corners of the building. The bottom right photo shows a section of the ornate parapet that decorates the building.

The Mansions consists of six three-storeyed terrace houses and was built in 1889 to a classic Italian design of GHM Addison (1857 - 1922), a Welsh-born architect who had arrived in Australia in 1883 and came to Brisbane in 1886. One of the early residents was Dr Lilian Cooper (1861 - 1947), Queensland's first woman doctor. After World War I the building became mainly boarding house accommodation. It was purchased by Queensland Government in 1954 to be used as offices.

# New Zealand Stone was used in The Mansions

In 1982 The Mansions was refurbished, including replacement of some of the Oamaru Stone. This stone was used extensively in the original construction (1889) on the verandahs, parapet and decorative motifs such as garlands and

A large cat at each end of the George Street facade. Oamaru Stone is a hard, compact limestone still quarried at Weston, near Oamaru in North Otago. (Oamaru is on the east coast of the South Island of New Zealand about 240 km south of Christchurch and 120 km north of Dunedin.)

Its ease of working appeals to sculptors; it is not strongly resistant to pollution and can be prone to surface crumbling. Oamaru Stone was used extensively in Queensland in the late nineteenth century. One hundred tons was imported aboard the 'May Newton' by Quinlan, Gray Co in June 1879. This company became Castlemaine Perkins in 1924. Architect Addison (1857-1922) used the stone in many of his buildings: Cumbooquepa (1890) in South Brisbane; Albert Street Wesleyan (now Uniting) Church (1888-9) and, of course, The St Patrick's Church, Morgan Street, Mansions. Fortitude Valley (an AG Stombuco design, consecrated 1882) has its High Altar of Oamaru Stone. The memorial to 'A' Battery Artillery in Toowong Cemetery is also of Oamaru stone. None is imported today; some stonemasons have small supplies they have gathered from demolition sites. I wish to thank Judith McKay, Hilda MacLean and Vince Mackenzie-Ross for their help in my compilation of this article.

# **Brisbane Tramway Company Limited**

A Brisbane bank recently located a parcel deposited with them for safe keeping by the Brisbane Tramway Company Limited in 1913. It contains duplicate keys for their safe and a letter concerning them. The parcel was opened once or twice. The parcel was stamped with Brisbane City Council Transport Department. The Brisbane Tramway Museum have indicated that the keys don't fit their safe which was believed to have come from the Brisbane Tramway Company Limited. # **Queensland History News for March**

(Collected by Ruth Kerr from personal Queensland contacts, Affiliated Societies and Newspapers)

Bardon in Brisbane – Rainworth House at 7 Barton Street, Bardon is for sale. It was constructed in 1862 for Augustus Charles Gregory, explorer and Queensland Surveyor General. Gregory lived in the house from 1862 until his death on 25 June 1905. The property has had four owners since Gregory. (Westside News 9 February 2011 p 14 including photo)

Cooktown – The Cooktown Historical Society recently highlighted the history of the provision of quarantine in the Cooktown area in response to disease on immigrant ships - eg Mecca in March 1877 (smallpox), Thales in April 1877 (plague), L'Allier (French) in February 1879 (malarial fever) and leprosy on subsequent ships. An encampment was set up on the North Shore with four wards and a kitchen. A permanent station was established there in 1886 and closed in 1889. The tramway was constructed in 1887 by Trotter and Bolles for £1855. It was little used and rails were removed to Samarai Island in New Guinea for use. The history of the tramway was written up by John and Ruth Kerr and published in Light Railways, July 1984, vol 22 no 85, pp 13-17. (Cooktown Local News 17-23 February 2011 p 9 including sketch of Quarantine Bay by Mrs Burkitt, wife of Customs Officer at Cooktown in 1892).

**Injune** – The Cultural Heritage Injune Preservation Society (CHIPS) is restoring the Injune railway station building for the 'Reunions of the Past' on the May long weekend. The CHIPS group is led by Mr Ray Klein. (Western Star 18 February 2011 p including photo)

Mount Molloy – At its February 2011 meeting the Queensland Heritage Council decided that the remains of the Mount Molloy sawmill are to be entered on the Queensland Heritage Register as No. 602776. The items being listed include: a Stirling water tube boiler, Marshall Steam engine, Walkers steam engine and electric sawmill building. The sawmill operated from 1913 to 1963. The manager's house is not being listed. The Department of Environment and Resource Management has called for public submissions on the proposed listing. (*Tablelands Advertiser* 18 February 2011 p 5)

# **Queensland Museum puts out call for flood objects and stories**

Do you have items that relate to the 2010 - 2011 Queensland floods disaster and its aftermath? Queensland Museum is collecting stories, objects and photographs that will preserve this significant historical event for future generations. Queensland Museum Curator Jo Besley said museums had a responsibility to preserve sensitively our collective

memory of shared catastrophic events. Although many people are still reeling from the recent events, it is important for us, as a community, to document the experience people went through, Ms Besley said. This will be an emotional time for everyone, especially when we are asking people to relive the experience by telling us their story and donating personal items that are the tangible scars of the floods. However the stories and accompanying objects will paint an evocative picture for future generations and in time to come, may give affected communities an opportunity to heal and rebuild their own history.

Examples of items include posters and flyers fundraising events, Mud Army t-shirts, instructions for volunteers, items from evacuation centres, damaged household items and wearable tokens of commemoration. Items that symbolise loss, great courage and community spirit will help us to tell this important Queensland story, Ms Besley said. The Museum is honoured to be in a position to share these experiences and is committed to treating each story and object with great sensitivity and respect.
