President's Report for August

The International Congress of Archivists this year has been held in a State rich in history and heritage. As Queensland's peak history body our Society is in a good position to see just how much is happening here: the valuable research being undertaken, the excellent publications, and the huge numbers of people who give time and considerable expertise to preserving our past. The technological advances have made many of our primary resources much more accessible, and interaction between historical groups is growing rapidly.

Ruth Kerr has been elected President of the Federation of Australian Historical Societies, and was congratulated at our recent Council meeting. It has been a great pleasure working with Don Garden, and we look forward to another period of great cooperation in the interests of Australian history.

Work on the Commissariat Store is progressing, slowly but surely. The concrete panelled wall is in place and the convict blocks are being laid out in preparation for the restoration of the stone wall. Who ever said there are no stone buildings in Queensland, only tin and timber? Not only are there stone buildings, there are wonderful stonemasons. The reception desk has been lowered by the Department of Public Works, the lighting has been repaired, and other maintenance issues have been attended to.

The Dig Tree Advisory Committee has welcomed the report of professional Arborist, Adam Tom. Further action will be taken to ensure, as much as is possible when dealing with Nature, that the tree will continue its long and healthy life for many years to come.

The Membership Committee recommended that a corporate membership be made available and this was approved at the recent Council meeting. This will allow members of a government departmental unit, local government unit, or company, to have members of that entity gain the benefits of a discount, should one be offered, if their members are attending a function, or for library research. This gives another way to join the Society and enjoy the benefits of membership. We have been around for almost a century and as well as looking back we must look to the future, and you, the members, and those yet to join, are our future.

Queensland News for August

(Collected by Ruth Kerr from personal Queensland contacts, Affiliated Societies and Newspapers)

Cooktown - Ernest Sydney Ashue, of Chinese ancestry, served in World War I. He was born in Cooktown in 1889 to Samuel Ashue and Rosina Clark. Samuel was an Anglo-Chinese Linguist (appointed 1875) and a Commission Agent. He had worked with an English family and was naturalised in Australia in 1882. He resided at the corner of Walker and John Streets. By 1900 the family was living in Charters Towers. When he enlisted he was a chauffeur. He had been a member of the 3rd Queensland (Kennedy) Regiment which was sent from Townsville to Thursday Island at the outbreak of war and mobilised as an infantry unit. Ernest enlisted in Brisbane on 17 September 1914 as a driver in first Division Supply Column and embarked at Melbourne on the Ceramic on 22 December 1914. He went to Britain and then to France. He suffered many illnesses during the war including nephritis. He returned to Australia on 16 July 1917 and died at 6th Australian General Hospital at Kangaroo Point, aged 28 years. Green Island – The Queensland Heritage Council has recommended that the Green Island Underwater Observatory (Lot 188 on SP113640) be entered on the Queensland Heritage Register. It will consider the matter again on 28 September. The Observatory is adjacent to the Green island Jetty on Green Island.

Mutchilba - The town is to obtain its name again. The fact has become a problem for residents who did not know that they had been included in Dimbulah. The issue has been publicised in the Weekend Australian on 14-15 July 2012 where it was stated that in 1999 the local shire had advised a Commonwealth government review of localities in Australia that Mutchilba be merged with Dimbulah and lose its place name. Local residents were very concerned when they realised and it has been an issue for emergency services agencies and residents seeking emergency service assistance. Minister for Natural

Resources in Queensland, Hon Andrew Cripps MP, has decided to reinstate the name Mutchilba and announced the change back. Mutchilba is an agricultural centre with approximately 1000 residents in the town and surrounding farms. It began as a tobacco growing area and Mutchilba had a railway station. Beaudesert - The Historical Society of Beaudesert now has its history catalogue/index on the Beaudesert Museum's website. The index covers historical documents relating to the Beaudesert district and the wider Scenic Rim Region. After its recent upgrade, it is in the form of a 1570 page pdf document. The index is free to download by googling: www.beaudesertmuseum.org.au then going to 'Research' on the right side of the homepage and clicking 'Archives and Library'. Because of the size of the index it may take several minutes to download.

Morven Historical Museum Inc has had a successful year so far with 120 more people through the Museum than the previous highest year. They are having a new shed built to house more equipment and displays. The school is celebrating its centenary on 7, 8 and 9 September and is publishing a book. Obituaries

Leith Fenton Barter joined the Royal Historical Society of Queensland Society on 1 October 1998. He died on 9 July 2012 aged 64 years. Leith had been a librarian in the Northern Territory Library. He had been actively involved in the Historical Society of the Northern Territory and was made a Life Member. He came to Queensland in the late 1990s. He worked a librarian and historian at the Pine Rivers Library until his retirement in 2010. He presented many historical talks to the Pine Rivers Historical Museum and the Royal Historical Society of Queensland. At the time of his death he was finishing a history of the Moreton Bay region. Diane Menghetti died on 18 June 2012. Diane joined the Society on 5 July 1988 and published several papers in the Society's *Journal*:

- 'Mine and Town Health and Safety on Charters Towers' Volume XIII, No. 6, May 1988 pp.215-228; and
- 'From Underground to opencut: The deskilling of the coal miner?' Volume 16 No. 8, November 1997 pp.353-370.

Diane was a lecturer in history at James Cook

University of Northern Queensland. Her research interests were mining, radical politics and Italian immigration. She wrote a social history of aspects of Charters Towers: *I remember: memories of Charters Towers* (published by James Cook University in 1989) and undertook mining heritage studies of Charters Towers and Ravenswood. She wrote nine books and around 70 papers. Diane was President of the Queensland National Trust in 2006-2007 and represented the Trust on the Queensland Heritage Council. She was also a committee member of the Australian Mining History Association.

Italian Velvet Bedspread

Preparations are now well underway for the Italian Presence exhibition, which will open on November 24 at the Commissariat Store Museum.

The Italian velvet bedspread is one of the objects that will be on display. It is believed that this bedspread was purchased by Rosaria Patane on her first return visit to Italy in 1959. It is a vintage Italian double bedspread made of soft velvet with decorative flower designs and cherubs. This type of bedspread was very much in vogue with the Queensland Italians during the 1950s up to the 1980s. The bedspread will be on loan from Grace Bonaccorso for the duration of the exhibition.

Other interesting objects to be on display include: a spaghetti machine, a souvenir miniature Sicilian horse and cart, clay moulds, a sugar cane knife and some beautiful Murano glass.

This exhibition is one not to be missed.


'Surveying Success: The Rise of the Hume Family in Colonial Queensland'

Walter and Katie Hume's story is one of social mobility in colonial Queensland between 1863 and 1901 as they rose in status and wealth from promising middle-class origins to membership of Queensland's social elite. It exemplifies the personal traits, social background and conformity with dominant British Victorian middle-class culture necessary to exploit the opportunities for success in the colony. Resident in Toowoomba and Brisbane, their network of family, friends and acquaintances was anchored to two powerful centres of the colony - the Darling Downs and the capital. This talk outlines how the Humes achieved their success.

Hilary Davies gained her PhD with a thesis examining middle-class social mobility in colonial Queensland using the Hume family as a case study. This has since been published as Surveying Success: The Hume Family in Colonial Queensland. She currently works as a Senior Heritage Officer in the Heritage branch of the Department of Environment and Heritage Protection.
