I have thought long and hard about what I would like to achieve during my term, and this is covered under three broad themes: First and foremost, I want to continue to increase community awareness of and participation in RHSQ activities. Attention needs to be given towards marketing tours of the Commissariat Store including the promotion of school visits to teachers and schools, and contacting external tour operators to attract more tourists.

It is also imperative that we continue to build awareness in government and business sectors of our position as Queensland's Peak History Body in order to attract greater sponsorship for projects such as the conservation of our prized artefacts, and to support our various Society events which are designed to promote Queensland's unique past.

Finally, I look forward to developing closer working relationships with our affiliated historical societies based in regional centres throughout Queensland.

Our Society celebrates its 100th anniversary in 2013, and as Chair of the Centenary Celebrations Committee I would like to take this opportunity to mention a few of the events planned in our year-long celebration: On 2 June (the 60th anniversary of the Queen Elizabeth II Coronation): a Centenary Fair will be held on the Commissariat Store grounds and Miller Park as part of Queensland Week. Attractions will include vintage cars, food, music, historic talks and films, and we will be inviting regional historical societies to take part by setting up stalls displaying their own unique history. The Growing Older and Living Dangerously (GOLD) initiative run by Brisbane City Council, the Queensland State Archives and National Trust of Queensland will also take part in the event, and we are looking forward to

working with them to create a fun filled informative day which will attract various groups from the community.

On 6 June: the Queensland Day Dinner will be held at the newly renovated Brisbane City Hall and on 21 August : the Centenary Dinner will be held in the Grand Ballroom at Tattersalls Club, Queen Street Brisbane. Numerous other events are being planned for the rest of the year so please look out for further details about these in upcoming *RHSQ Bulletins*.

Next year's events will be a celebration of the Society's past and a view towards the future. Through the use of social media websites such as Facebook and Twitter, as well as the imminent launch of our new website, the Society is engaging with a new generation of budding historians. The Queensland History Journal and Welsby Library continue as the cornerstones of the Society and support our position as Queensland's Peak History Body, providing unique research opportunities for historians both professional and amateur.

American writer Dale Carnegie stated, 'People rarely succeed unless they have fun in what they are doing.' I think that the passion exhibited by everyone involved in the Royal Historical Society of Queensland towards the conservation and promotion of Queensland's heritage and history will ensure the enduring success of our Society for another hundred years. Queensland News for September

Australian Railway Historical Society (Queensland Division), an affiliated member of the Royal Historical Society of Queensland was formed in 1957 and has now run over 950 railway excursions. The latest one was the Vinelander to Stanthorpe on 25 and 26 August with a dinner at the Queensland College of Wine Tourism. (*Bayside Star* 8 August 2012 p.27)

Blackbutt – Greg Hallam, Society member and Queensland Rail staff member, describes the centenary celebrations of the railway arriving in Blackbutt: 'Even though the railway line closed 20 years ago, they still love Queensland Rail up in Blackbutt. Saturday 8 September was NOT the actual railway centenary, as was told to the crowds by the locals but, in time honoured tradition of such things the recognition was brought forward from December, to coincide with the *Bloomin' Beautiful Blackbutt* Festival on 2 September 2012. The local heritage group meet in a place called Nukku Nook, which used to be the old Nukku State School, (a one teacher school), which was transplanted to the old Blackbutt railway station location last year. It used to have a enrolment of about 20 tops, so it was rather cosy for the day. Hence the outside activities. For the railway centenary in such a confined space they put on a great little display of railway memorabilia, and again about 250 people rolled through on the day. At the original opening in 1912 the Wondai/Blackbutt town band played for the occasion, so in keeping with history, the Wondai band again performed for the event. A great example of country spirit, is how one recreates the arrival of the first official steam train into the town, when one does not have a railway? Eminently simple! One brings a steam traction engine in from Kingaroy, and with it blowing its whistle (and providing great theatrical effects), it then parts the blue ribbon held by two young ladies in a recreation of what happened a century ago. Also, one gets a ride on an amusement train, without rails, to transport people around.

Queensland Rail's display was greatly appreciated, and the first trial of our community history DVD was well received. We use images from Eric Marggraf's collection plus the Historical Collection, so it is another cost effective way to tell the story of the railways in Queensland. There was also a reunion of former railway employees on the Brisbane Valley line, which worked well'. (Greg Hallam's Report on *Bloomin' Beautiful Blackbutt* Event 10 September 2012).

Bundaberg – The book, *Built by Bundaberg Foundry*, by two Society members, Brian Webber and John Browning, was launched in Bundaberg on 21 August at the foundry. The book outlines the history of eight steam trains built in 1952-53 and 11 small diesels built in 1953-63 at the foundry. The book is on sale at the Australian Sugar Cane Railway Museum in Bundaberg for \$20. (*News Mail* [Bundaberg] 22 August 2012 p.2 including photograph).

Imbil – Mary Valley State College (formerly Imbil State High School) celebrated its 50th anniversary on 22 September. The high school was originally conducted in the Imbil Public Hall and the former Brooloo State School which was transported into town. There were 26 students when it began. The new school was built on a former vegetable farm in Edward Street. (*Gympie Times* 11 August 2012 p.14 including photograph of Form 3 students in 1962 and of the Brooloo school building being hauled by a truck). **Goomburra** – The railway centenary was celebrated on 19 August 2012. The Southern Downs Steam Railway arranged steam train trips to the town from Clifton and Warwick. Society member and Queensland Rail Historian, Greg Hallam, attended. Historical displays were mounted in the Goomburra Hall and DVDs shown. (Warwick *Daily News* 14 August 2012 p.9)

Nambour - On Wednesday, 1 June ex-Moreton Mill steam locomotive *Bli-Bli* (John Fowler 0-4-2 No 14418) was moved from Muller Park, Bli Bli to the grounds of the Nambour and District Historical Museum, Nambour. The loco is not in a good state with vandals having stolen all the brass off it and the salt air not doing the rest of it any favours. The loco is to be tidied up, a roof erected over it and the locomotive fenced in. (Durundur Railway *Bulletin* (ANGRMS) vol.33 no.317, September - October 2012, p. 11 and Cane Trains discussion group)

Roma held its 150th anniversary celebrations from 27 August to 3 September. The anniversary celebrated was of the gazettal of Roma as a town. The celebrations were held at the Big Rig Parklands. A vintage tea party was also arranged at *Mount Abundance* homestead for 2 September. (*Western Star* 24 August 2012 p.8 including photograph of a historic tea party at *Mount Abundance*)

Toowoomba – A photograph in 1971 of the Mother's Memorial in Margaret Street featured in the Toowoomba *Chronicle* on 27 August 2012 on page 18. The memorial was completed in 1922 and dedicated to local men who died in World War I. The memorial was relocated to east Street Park in 1985.

Wolfram Camp – The Wolfram Camp mine has been reopened by Wolfram Camp Mining, a division of Deutsche Rohstoff AG of Germany. Project development had begun in July 2011 and the first shipment of wolfram from Australia occurred in February 2012. The company is planning to produce 7,000 tonnes of wolfram concentrate over the next four years and 800 tonnes of molybdenum. Wolfram mining began in the area in 1894 and was developed by John Moffat's Irvinebank Mining Company Pty Ltd. The nearby remains of the Thermo Electric Ore Reduction Corporation Limited's mill which operated 1918-1920 are on the Oueensland heritage Register. The role of wolfram mining in North Queensland before World War I was research and written up by Ruth Kerr in her paper, 'German Demand for Wolfram, Tin and Copper in North Oueensland, 1890 -1914'. Research Report for September

Three of our staff have been away this month – one to write a history report and two travelling. So it is as well that there have been fewer queries than usual. We have been asked about Central Western Oueensland history: Brisbane River for an exhibition; photos of George Street precinct and Eagle Farm; Alan Fletcher Research Station at Sherwood; Queensland Mining heritage; a silky oak filling cabinet; images of an 'American' style two storey farm house; image of 1912 Strike Coupon; value of a collection of books relating to the Rockmount District on the Darling Downs; Sutton & Co; photo of Samuel Griffith; Sandgate railway; indigenous basket weaving styles; images of the Commissariat Store; Croydon Junction; Rose Campbell née Clayton; Stodart Military Cross; vessels connected with Woody Point; Sunshine Coast, Buderim and Yandina; and ice and iceworks.

Background searches of the Rockhampton files and history of education in Queensland have been made by an interstate visitor writing a family history. A descendant of Architect Campbell-Wilson sought information on the Brisbane Town Hall built 1864/5 and we were able to produce from our Archives a very early plan of the ground floor of the building designed by W Coote.
