His reorganisation of the space in B2 was very practical, and during his time on the Council Ken arranged to move the art works up off the floor and onto the good strong supports that are there now. Ken was also a great guide, continuously updating his knowledge of the Commissariat Store and Queensland's history. We wish Ken all the very best in his future endeavours.

The Brisbane Open House event, organised by the Brisbane Development Association, the National Trust of Queensland and the Office of the Queensland Government Architect, was held on Saturday 6 October 2012. It was a phenomenal success with 720 people passing through the doors of the Commissariat Store between 10.00 am and 3.00 pm – a significant increase from last year which saw an attendance of over 500 people.

Queensland News for October

(Collected by Ruth Kerr from personal Queensland contacts, Affiliated Societies and Newspapers)

Border Markers – Cameron's, Hadden's and Poeppel's Corners have been nominated for their historic significance for inclusion on the Queensland Heritage Register. These corners mark the boundaries in south west Queensland with New South Wales, South Australia and Northern Territory. Cameron's Corner was marked with a timber post in 1880 and replaced by a concrete one in 1969. (*Warrego Watchman* 6 September 2012 p.5) **Charleville** – The future of the historic Warrego Club is being assessed in Charleville. It is currently owned by the Charleville Memorial RSL Club. (*Warrego Watchman* 13 September 2012 p.5)

Maytown – A memorial to the Palmer Goldfield miner, Sam Elliott, was removed recently with permission from the *Palmerville* Holding and reerected by the Cairns Four Wheel Drive Club at Maytown. The need for the removal occurred because the road to Maytown had been relocated by Cook Shire Council in recent years. (*Tablelands Advertiser* 21 September 2012 p.5)

Peranga on the Oakey – Cooyar Railway celebrated its centenary on 29 September 2012. The railway through Peranga closed in 1964. A photograph of the last train through Peranga was published in the *Toowoomba Chronicle* on 13 September 2012 on page 27.

Stradbroke Island – The Queensland Heritage Council decided on 28 September 2012 not to enter the former Tipplers Tavern building on the Heritage Register as it does not satisfy one or more of the criteria listed in s.35 (1) of the *Queensland Heritage Act 1992.* (Information supplied by the Department of Environment and Heritage Protection and *Queensland Government Gazette* 12 October 2012)

Yeppoon - A letter to the editor of the *Capricorn Coast Mirror* on 19 September 2012 was very critical of the government's proposal to sell the local unused railway station building. The author advocated re-use to promote the town's tourism. (*Capricorn Coast Mirror* 19 September 2012 p.10)

Research Report for October

The following requests have been made this month: the age of a house in Herston (more details were requested and advice given on how to trace the history of a house); Journal of Australian Studies; Dr Sandford Jackson and his contribution to the Society; images of the equipment used by McDowell for Radio 4CM; conscription debates during World War I; a jetty at Cleveland during the Moreton Bay Penal Settlement period; passengers arriving on the *Artemesia;* and David Bull of Cooroy. It has been a quiet period but Lyndsay Smith's return from holidays has enabled the clearance of a backlog of requests for copies of photos in the collection. Kay Cohen has also returned from overseas.

A visit from the president and research officer of the Blackbird organisation based in Townsville saw the examination of the petition for the release of mariners on the ship the *Hopeful* who were tried for killing people while they were blackbirding in New Guinea. Other material on such ships was also examined.

Library Report October

Catalogue: Many typographical and other errors have been corrected. The listing of and checking of the Government Papers in the collection has continued. More photos and Photo Album images have been added to the collection.

Repair and restoration of items in the Collection: The Flinders Charts and Volumes 1 and 2 of ML Fox, *History of Queensland* and a copy of *Votes & Proceedings* have recently been professionally rebound thus increasing the value of these items. Further consideration is to be given to conservation of some books and manuscripts in the collection.

Offers: Several items have been offered to the Society. We have accepted some etchings of buildings in Brisbane in a small set from the Second World War period; and after viewing some material relating to a former teacher of Somerville House we have advised the donors that it would be best to donate them to the school which has a highly developed archives collection.

Cilento Papers: We have recently been informed that Ruth Cilento is offering Sir Raphael Cilento's remaining papers to the State Library and to the Fryer Library. We will seek information about any items which would be relevant for our collection and would reflect his work during his long association with the Society.


'The Plague in Brisbane'

In 1900 a very unwelcome visitor arrived in Brisbane from Sydney. It was the plague, the Black Death, carried by the fleas on rats; and although its arrival was not unexpected, little seems to have been done to prepare for it. The city was in crisis, as victims and their families were packed off to isolation camps. The disease died down after a time - but then it returned, again and again. Writer Pamela Rushby, will share the fruits of her research into this dark period of Brisbane's History.

Mephisto

As Rememberance Day 2012 approaches I feel it is timely to publish a letter I received earlier this year from Neville MacPherson. Here it is. Ed

'It was fascinating that the German tank, Mephisto, was featured on the front page of the April Bulletin.

There is so much for Queenslanders to celebrate in having it at the new Museum over at Southbank. Originally, it was over at Bowen Hills and many a child (including me) played in it/on it during its time there. Now, it is behind glass and you can't get anywhere near it. A fellow (Mark Whitmore??), who I met when he was at the AWM in Canberra (about 10 years ago he took up a posting in London at the IWM), wrote a book on Mephisto.The book is worth reading.

Did you realize that it is THE ONLY German tank which survives from WWI: that it was captured at Villers-Brettoneaux (where that other great and substantial Queenslander, Sir William Glasgow, whose statue was removed from Roma Street and is now located overlooking Adelaide Street near the Shrine, was in command of the 'other' (forgotten) Brigade who captured the now Australian monument [will those darn Victorians and their 'Pompey' Elliott the man who, very sadly, committed suicide in the early 1930s - let us forget their man who led the 'otherbrigade'!?].

A couple of years ago (around July, 2009), my wife and I squeezed in a tour of the Western Front. The tour was arranged by a Kenmore company, but was led by a former British fellow who lived in France (I reckon he would have been, at best, a WO2 in the British Army - and probably from the Provost Corps, at that !!) Anyway, we went to V-B and I thought that Mephisto would be front and centre of any visit there, particularly given that most of the tour group were Queenslanders, who were my vintage and probably saw Mephisto at the old musuem at Bowen Hills; given that the tour group was from Kenmore (although the tour leader had never visited Brisbane, let alone Australia); and given my express desire to see where Mephisto was captured (which was not very far from V-B). However, despite the promise, we were shown instead a model of Mephisto in the V-B Museum; then, when we got out of the Museum, we turned right instead of left (where Mephisto was captured - the first 'tank on tank' battle in history. in which Mephisto had participated!) and were taken to the Adelaide Cemetery to see the tomb of the 'unknown soldier', which we were all supposed to be interested in (we were, but not overly so!!); lastly, on the bus back to our hotel, we saw a VERY dated video about Mephisto which featured Mark Whitmore when he was still at the Qld Museum (the video must have been about 20 years out of date!). I still feel cheated!!

Finally, did you realize that German delegation came out to Brisbane in order to take accurate measurements of the tank so that a replica of Mephisto could be built in Germany? I'd say that both the Germans and the English would give their eye teeth for the original!! Take care,
