



The Brisbane Commissariat c 1870

This is a view of the north-western side of the Brisbane Commissariat taken around 1870 from the vacant block next door (now Miller Park). Miller Park was named in memory of Captain Henry Miller (1785 - 1866), first Commandant of Moreton Bay, who arrived at Redcliffe on 14 September 1824, 190 years ago. Note the door giving access to the upper floor, which was part of the original plan. Behind the Commissariat is the present National Trust House that was built in 1865 as an Immigration Depot. Both buildings fronted Queen's Wharf Road, which allowed easy access to the wharves on the river. There are three other Commissariats in Australia, two are featured on Page 4.

President's Report

With celebrations for the Brisbane Festival and G20 keeping everyone on their toes, it has been a busy month for the Society.

Our inaugural Riverfire cocktail event was a great success, with 60 people enjoying dinner and drinks in the Commissariat Store courtyard on Saturday 27 September 2014. This event was sponsored by King and Company solicitors and catered by Cuisine on Cue, who also catered our Queensland Day Dinner this year. Artist Bill Gannon put together a display of his artwork inside the building, inspired by his journey in the footsteps of Ludwig Leichhardt's famous 1844 expedition to Port Essington in the Northern Territory; he provided a very interesting commentary on his journey. Guests were thrilled to find that the path of the Super Hornets went straight overhead; the Black Hawk manoeuvres provided entertainment over the river on either side of the Commissariat Store. The pièce de résistance for the evening, however, was the fireworks: one of the fireworks barges was positioned directly in front of our main gates, providing a magnificent view of the half-hour fireworks display.

The annual Brisbane Open House took place on Saturday 11 October and Sunday 12 October from 10.00 am to 3.00 pm. This event is always a great success with almost 1000 people walking through the Commissariat Store again this year. The event is a wonderful showcase of Brisbane's architectural and heritage buildings, and has been warmly embraced by the public.

We were fortunate to receive a visit from Ludwig Leichhardt, the great - great -great nephew of his famous namesake, on Wednesday 15 October. Ludwig was in Australia to attend the naming ceremony of a new QANTAS aircraft – named *Ludwig Leichhardt* in recognition of the 170th anniversary of Leichhardt's Port Essington expedition – and included visits to a variety of historical venues in his itinerary. He was particularly taken with the notion that Leichhardt would have visited the Commissariat Store in his journeys to Moreton Bay in the 1840s: a tangible link to the past!

During the time of the G20 celebrations the Commissariat Store, along with Miller Park, Neville Bonner Building, and other key buildings along North Quay will be the focus of an artistic lighting display, put together by a team within the Premier's Department. Our final event for this year will be the Separation Day Cocktails on Wednesday 10 December. A flyer for this is enclosed with this month's *Bulletin*. Our special guest this year is the Honourable Ian Walker MP, Minister for Science, IT, Innovation and the Arts, who will launch the spectacular new publication *Lost Brisbane*. This book is the result of months of hard work undertaken by a team of RHSQ researchers – Margaret Kowald, Val Donovan, Jean Stewart, Kay Cohen, Ruth Kerr and Lyndsay Smith – in partnership with QBD Books.

Queensland News for October

News from around the State(Collected by Ruth Kerr from personal Queensland contacts, Affiliated Societies and Newspapers)

Chillagoe – The Queensland State Government has spent \$230,000 on a visitor facility at Chillagoe smelters. This includes a new car park, interpretative shelters, educational signage and two short walking tracks. The tracks provide a good view of the three chimneys, smelters and surrounding landscape. No work has been done on the three chimneys since the Keating government's restoration of one under the 'One Nation' program in 1994. (*Tablelands Advertiser* 3 October 2014 p.3)

Gympie – Mary Valley Rattler volunteers Ken Whimpey, Keith Gadiscke, Ted Neilsen, Arthur Ayrton and Dean King, are keen to work the line again and expressed their great enthusiasm in the workshop, following the Deputy Premier, The Honourable Jeff Seeney's decision to provide \$600,000 for rolling stock repairs and \$2 million for track repairs. The Labor Shadow State Development Minister, Tim Mulherin MP, spoke in parliament against the grant from Royalties for the Regions Program. (*Cooloola Advertiser* 2 September 2014 p.2 and *Gympie Times* 30 August 2014 p.3)

Hervey Bay – Urangan's railway pier was saved from demolition in 1985 and has been restored. The Save the Pier Committee held a festival on the last weekend of September focusing on the pier. The Hervey Bay Historical Village and Museum is involved. (*Fraser Coast Chronicle* 26 September 2014 p.32 including photograph)

Normanby Station – Endeavour River – The *Cooktown Local News* recently featured a photograph of the Normanby railway station on the Cooktown to Laura railway. It was a galvanised iron building with hipped roof. Life on nearby Normanby pastoral

station was also recorded by Norman Palmer – harsh and challenging – with dingoes being a problem. There were three Endeavour River schools with a travelling teacher who taught students in their homesteads. (*Cooktown Local News* 24 July 2014 p.9 including photograph)

Ravenshoe – The Transport Regulator in Queensland Transport and Main Roads has issued an order for the close down of the D17 Capella steam locomotive and its passenger carriages which currently operate a tourist trip from Ravenshoe to Tomoulin and back. The train has been operating for 26 years except for a period for locomotive repairs and track repairs. The Transport Regulator has advised that maintenance of the infrastructure and rollingstock and governance and safety are the reasons for the close down. The train has carried an average of 6500 passengers per year in recent years. (Atherton *Tablelander* 9 September 2014 p.1)

Traveston Crossing - Mary Valley District -Two bridges on the Mary Valley Link Road were named by Member for Gympie, David Gibson MP, after the Bason and Groves families. Jack and Elizabeth Bason arrived in 1874 from England and selected land at Tiaro and then Coles Creek area. William Groves owned a property called Rock Farm Traveston Crossing Road. The familes intermarried. The Mary River bridge on Mary Valley Link Road is adjacent to the old Groves farm. (Gympie Times 13 September 2014 p. 8 including photograph)

Brisbane Suburban History

Toowong – *Middenbury* House, part of the former ABC studios site on Coronation Drive has been entered on the Queensland Heritage Register. The house was built in the 1860s. On 2 November 1959 it hosted 300 guests to mark the ABC's first Queensland TV Broadcast. Sunland Group now owns the property. (*Westside News* 20 August 2014 p.15 including photograph)

Research Report

In presenting my last report before I leave Brisbane I wish to place on record my thanks to all those who have helped me with the RHSQ Library and Research Department since I began providing this service in 1995. In those days the Commissariat Store was open for very limited hours and we worked on Wednesdays from 11.00 am until 2.00 pm. Later the hours changed from 10.00 am until 4.00 pm on Thursdays and this has been maintained ever since including the three years in National Trust House (then Federation House) when the Store was being refurbished from 1999-2001 and again in 2011 when the flood interrupted the use of the Store.

It has been a rewarding and stimulating time to help the thousands of people who have sought our assistance with their research and it has been rewarding to have so many acknowledge our help with gratitude. The installation of computers and the establishment of the InMagic Catalogue system for the Library have been a great boon. The Library catalogue has been streamlined and the collection has been made more accessible. There have been many dedicated and knowledgeable people working in this area of the Society's business over the years and I thank them all particularly the long serving current group most of whom have worked with me for at least ten years and I have been grateful for their support. skills and knowledge - Val Donovan, Kay Cohen, Ruth Kerr, Beth Johnson, Lyndsay Smith, and Claire Stewart.

Oueries in the last two months have included the following: St Luke's Church, now the Pancake Parlour; Eskgrove House of Archibald Hepburn Hutchison in built 1852/3; naming of Ruth St, Highgate Hill; nurses in the US Army 105th General Hospital in Australia 1942-1944; Woolcock House, Waterworks Road; Thelma Huddy who drowned in the Pine River in 1944; Chinese residents in Freestone; Prospector/explorer Phil Saunders in Arnhem Land; James Lord and Ada Rosamond Pearce, immigrants in 1874; midwife records for Roma Hospital; General MacArthur and possible use of the Dental Hospital; Scarborough Non Official Post Office; names on a WWI Honour Board; Savings Bank building on corner of George and Elizabeth Streets; photos of Avro plane and visit of Prince of Wales; origin of name of Mount Hallen near Esk; Sir Edmund Lockyer for 190th anniversary in September 2015; bravery medal for Muara Lifu, Torres Strait; Martin Wilson building, 200 Mary Street; German musicians in Queensland; Moreton bay Convict era information; Newstead House; Patrick Kenniff; and 1864 fires in Brisbane.

The Hobart Commissariat

The Hobart Commissariat Store was built between 1808 and 1810 so is 19 years older than the Brisbane Commissariat. Like the Brisbane store it was built to house important foodstuff and vital military supplies and was positioned close to the waterfront to allow easy access to the ships bringing in supplies.

In 1811 the position of this store was used by James Meehan to make a town plan for Hobart. It was used to define the alignment of Macquarie Street, which served as a baseline for street planning in the town.

This building is now part of the Tasmanian Museum and Art Gallery complex that is situated at the corner of Macquarie and Argyle Streets, Hobart. Other Commissariat Stores are on Norfolk Island, built 1835 and Launceston, built 1828. Sydney had two Commissariat Stores, but both have been demolished leaving only the foundation stone of the second.

To the right is a Norfolk Museum Photograph of the Norfolk Island Commissariat Store, which took only six months to build in 1835. The results of the haste in building can be seen when viewing one of the facades where a window sill is noticeably out of alignment.

In 1874 the main and lower floor ceilings were removed so that double storey space could be created for All Saints Church to be consecrated. The basement was opened as a museum in the 1990s.


