

A RARE FORM OF TRANSPORT QUEENSLAND RAIL AMBULANCES

Early in the 20th century roads in western Queensland were difficult to traverse, especially after heavy rain. To overcome this problem, the first rail ambulance was introduced in 1918 to enable injured people from the mining centre at Blair Athol to be quickly conveyed to the closest hospital at Clermont.

The rail ambulance at Goondiwindi was introduced in 1923 and was retired in the 1950s. Other towns known to have had rail ambulances include: Dalby, Mount Mulligan, Roma, Charleville, Baralba, Cloncurry, Blackall, Charters Towers, Pentland, Atherton, Ravenshoe and Millaa Millaa. The last rail ambulances were withdrawn in 1990.

David's grandfather Adolph carried the little five chamber nickel plated revolver with him on the first survey of Poeppel's corner in 1879. He eventually turned to law and some of you may remember the well known firm of Feez Ruthning, Solicitors in Brisbane. Coincidently my great uncle Adalbert was the Ruthning in that firm.

This *Bulletin* contains a flyer promoting our membership month in April. Please try to introduce a new member in April and your Society will be very grateful. The museum team is busy preparing our World War One display, which will be constantly updated every year to reflect the course of the war. I visited the offices of Births Deaths and Marriages on Monday to see their carefully kept volumes on all Queenslanders who served in WW1. We are the only State who recorded this information totally and it is worth a visit to see them. One page had a letter dated 1916 attached from a mother thanking BDM for telling her that her son had died in action. Sadly the Army had failed to do so.

We are organising a special trip to the 'Dig Tree' in June.

The new Eagle Farm interpretive centre is nearing completion and your Society has been invited to the official opening later this year. The building has been specially constructed to enable visitors to view the location of the convict women's prison, the original Hangar 7 built in WW2 to enable Japanese warplanes to be re-built from wrecks salvaged from New Guinea and the Pacific Islands and then flown to find out their capabilities and finally the historic aircraft engine testing facility which tested V12 Allisons before they were installed into P38 Lightning, P40D Kittyhawks and P39 Airacobra fighting aircraft.

Oueensland News for March

Brooweena – Woocoo Shire Office constructed in 1915 is now in the Woocoo Historical Society grounds at Brooweena. In December 2014 at the Christmas Party several descendents of previous Woocoo Shire Councillors and the last Mayor, Gloria Banting, attended to commemorate the history of the shire and the building. The shire council chambers were constructed in 1915 by AT Miller and Son of Maryborough for £135. When the shire was formed in 1914 the shire population was 600. (Woocoo Historical Society *Newsletter* Vol.29 No.1, March 2015, pp 1-3 including photograph)

Cardwell – The Historical Buffs in the Cardwell Historical Society appeared in historical costume on Cardwell railway station to welcome the Q150 steam train in February. It was their second outing having obtained Regional Arts Development Funding funding in 2014 for the purpose. (*Herbert River Express* 21 February 2015 p.6 including photograph)

Cooktown – Charles Christopher Harris's collecting of botanical species is featured in the Cooktown Local News of 22 January 2015. He sent the Cooktown area ferns from Endeavour River to Queensland Museum. The Brisbane Courier reported in November 1883 he also sent fish and reptiles. These species arrived at the same time that a collection of minerals (over 500 pieces) arrived from David C McConnel of Cressbrook, Toogoolawah and fish and reptiles from Ling Roth. 
Longreach – The Stockman's Hall of Fame received a \$5 million grant in September 2014 from the Commonwealth government and has installed a number of attractions and maintenance. Half of the funds are being used for refurbishment of the building and a new cafe. \$500,000 is being utilised for an indigenous stockman's exhibition by the end of April. The final \$2 million will be expended on an

undercover equestrian and multi purpose centre in 2016. A restored Royal Flying Doctor Service Queen Air aircraft is hung from the ceiling as part of the upgrade of that exhibition. It was obtained from a museum in Mareeba. It was refurbished and repainted at Caboolture and was delivered to Longreach for a total cost of \$250,000. Mount Molloy – The Mount Molloy RSL has decided to move the cenotaph and flag pole from the main street because of increased traffic through the town. A new cenotaph will be constructed behind the shire hall but in view from the street. The Mareeba Shire Council donated \$770 for concrete for the base. (*Tablelands Advertiser* 16 January 2015 p.3)

Tewantin – The collection of photographs taken by Sam Griffiths, who established *Noosa News* in 1968, has been donated to Noosa Shire Council Library. Sam Griffiths, a photographer, and his son, Bill, took the photographs between the 1960s and 1990s. The first stage of the public launch of public access to the collection was held at the library on 25

February 2015. The photographs will be placed on Noosa Picture Online. (*Noosa News* 17 February 2015 p.3 including photograph of the toad race)

Research Report

The inquiries/requests continue to arrive steadily, often as a result of the publication Lost Brisbane (LB). They include: an offer of a donation of postcards from descendants of a person who worked at the Windmill; possibility of identifying, from an attached photograph, a convict 'punishment ball' which is on loan to the Redcliffe Museum, without success; then and now pictures of Brisbane for WWI Anzac coverage by Courier Mail; identification of the type of transport used for immigrants arriving in Mackay and travelling to Springsure in 1882; pinball machine arcades in Brisbane during the last 50 to 70 years, eg Timezone Albert Street; photographs for WW1 display at Federation House; location of a diary of Colin William Mackay, donated to Newstead House - not located; survey for history of the koala fur trade; people of North Stradbroke Island in relation to WW1 War Memorial; site information on Red Hill Roller Skating Arena, 2 & 14 Enoggera Terrace; a publication from The Queenslander 1879 - 1880, 'Lost in the Winning'; history of Boaga, a property situated at the mouth of Baffle Creek, north of Bundaberg; information/photos on Kinkabool, Surfers Paradise; appointment to view historical images of the City and South Brisbane; information re the plumbing firm of Peter Fleming (LB, p. 81); request for images of Narcisse Pelletier from Swiss editor; images of the former Queensland Book Depot store in Brisbane; clarification of photograph of the Butler family farm at Brookfield (LB, p. 161); info re Army infrastructure at Tingalpa; image of Ellen Wickham,

second wife of Captain JC Wickham; and history for family associated with Old Burnett Inn, Nanango and Kilcoy Station.

The Exhibitions Coordinator of the Supreme Court Library and her colleague visited to view the Society's Museum collection and to discuss the management of same. A client who had requested information on the naming of her property visited to do further research on the topic, and she joined the RHSQ. Some success for visitors researching James Hexton, and convict Hannah Rigby; a visit from three members of the Bulimba Historical Society relating to *Lost Brisbane*; researcher of Pettigrew diaries, and of John Kerr's railway database, and a visit from a researcher from Stradbroke Island Museum.

Book Review

Michael Brumby. Black Gold: From Gateway to Golden Lands – the True Story of the Founding of Townsville to the Finding of Gold at Charters Towers. (Charters towers, Charters Towers Archives, 2014) (180p, illus, index, biblio, glossary, maps, ISBN 9780957900974)

Michael Brumby, Officer of the Charters Towers and Dalrymple Archives Group in the Charters Towers Regional Council Library, has researched and written a very good reference book with fresh eyes on the establishment of Townsville and the discovery and early development of Charters Towers. The result is book with a sense of unity in its creation because of the author's analysis of how Townsville and Charters Towers depended on each other. The book is very easy to read with a clear approach to a subject on which extensive writing has already been done in various forms and forums over the years. Charters Towers was known as 'The World' and Queensland's largest inland town at its peak and its discovery story is assessed carefully (pp.110-113). In contrast Townsville prospered as a port and commercial centre servicing hinterland pastoral stations and towns.

Access to primary sources has always been a challenge for north Queensland historians. Michael Brumby acknowledges and has used extensively the pioneering research by Jim Manion, manager of Townsville *Daily Bulletin*; John Mathew, a town planner with the Townsville City Council; Anne Allingham, at James Cook University; and Joe Janecek, a geologist of Charters Towers. The author has done very well researching at James Cook University Library John Ewen Davidson's Diary from

the summary transcript, as well as the manuscript of the late Jim Manion's unpublished biography of Robert Towns (after whom Townsville is named) and the transcript of Towns' and John Melton Black's correspondence 1864-1865. These resources together with TROVE and *Queensland Government Gazettes* are the foundation for this book. Another Charters Towers researcher, Don Johnson's material has not been utilized, probably because of the difficulties surrounding its availability.

Black to Gold also illustrates the necessarily different research approach by a northerner compared to a southerner with reference to the early pastoral lease history. Michael Brumby has utilized the Queensland Government Gazettes for most of that information, whereas a southerner would have accessed the Commissioner for Crown Lands Office Registers, Treasury Run Rent Registers, and Lands Department Run Registers at Queensland State Archives.

There is a tantalising unanswered question in the early section of the book. Why did John Melton Black choose to go to north Queensland to establish a pastoral empire? He had already amassed a fortune by 1855 from the carrying business between Melbourne and Bendigo goldfield. He then established the Theatre Royal in Melbourne in 1855, renamed the Princess Theatre in 1857. Perhaps it was related to his brother's suicide in the theatre in 1861 or a connection to Sydney merchant, Robert Towns, or announcements after Separation of land and business opportunities in north Queensland. The North was settled by many successful southerners and Michael Brumby draws out their achievements in the book.
