THE ROYAL HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF QUEENSLAND Proposed Amendment to Constitution for Annual General Meeting on 29 September 2016

The Society's Council proposes the following amendment to the constitution of The Royal Historical Society of Queensland at the Annual General Meeting, on Thursday 29 September 2016: Clause 15 (a) second line amend 'three months' to read 'five months'

Reason: This will allow the Annual General Meeting to be held within five months of the end of the financial year, which will be by the end of November rather than the end of September. The extension is required to allow our auditors extra time to audit the financial accounts each year, which they do at no cost, as the short time period is proving difficult for the auditors to meet.

Fellowship

The Society's Council has recommended that Dr Margaret Kowald be awarded a Fellowship under Rule 35 of the Constitution, for her research, writing, editorship of *Queensland History Journal*, publications including her role in two Lost Brisbane books.

Dr Margaret Kowald

- member of RHSQ since July 1992;
- editor of the RHSQ *Journal* since February 2007 (subsequently renamed *Queensland History Journal*);
- member of Publications Committee and has done detailed negotiations with Printer about price and size including introduction of colour photographs and maps into the *Queensland History Journal*;
- member of the founding committee for the John Douglas Kerr Medal of Distinction for Research and Writing Queensland and Australian History;
- an author of *Lost Brisbane and surrounding areas 1860-1960* and *Lost Brisbane 2 and surrounding areas: the later years;* and
- professional historian and author of several books.

MacGregor Medal

The Society's Council has recommended that Mrs Beth Johnson be awarded a MacGregor Medal under Rule 35 of the Constitution, for her role in the Research and Library Team over ten years.

Mrs Beth Johnson

- joined the society in May 2003;
- trained as a teacher at Kelvin Grove Teachers College
- wrote mathematics books for children for Longman Cheshire;
- commenced as an Honorary Research Officer in 2005 after she had finished her history book on Robert Cribb;
- has prepared three Book Auction Catalogues for the Society;
- extended the index to the society's *Journal*, managed the rearrangement of the several thousand vertical files (subject, district and families) in the Society's Library, rationalized the Society's serial collection, and catalogued photographs; and
- published a paper on Fanny Trundle in February 2011 issue of *Queensland History Journal*.

Queensland News

News from around the State

Crow's Nest - Munro's Tramline, which linked Hampton with the timber districts of Palm Tree, Ravensbourne and Bunkers Hill, is accessible by car and is being revived for tourists. A new interpretive sign system guides those visiting a three km section of the line, starting from the Perseverance reserve and proceeding west. Councillor Joe Ramia and Barry Munro, a descendant of one of the Munro brothers who built the railway and ran the Palm Tree timber mill, unveiled one of signs at a function attended by more than 40 people on 5 June. The Munro Tramway Historical Group obtained a grant of \$3860 from Toowoomba Regional Council to place the signs at locations accessible to tourists or walkers. Each sign has maps of the line and a recorded message about the tramway.

Archibald and Duncan Munro, who were store owners in Toowoomba, built the first 12 km of the tramway in 1896-7, linking Hampton (on the Toowoomba to Crow's Nest rail line) to their timber mill at Palm Tree. Duncan was Chairman of the Highfields Shire Council and Archibald was Mayor of Toowoomba. It was a horse drawn tramway carrying sawn timber to Hampton. In 1903-4 they extended the line 2.5 km towards Ravensbourne where they collected logs from a one mile long steel cable that hauled the logs up the escarpment. They then bought a Shay steam locomotive from USA (No.906 of 1904), and a second loco was bought in about 1908 (No.2097) after they started extending the two-foot-six-inch gauge rail line a further 11.5 km east to Bunkers Hill where they loaded logs.

The Hampton-Esk Road now passes Bunkers Hill. This expansion took place from 1907 to 1915. The settlement at Palm Tree included the timber mill, 20 workers' houses, a store, butcher shop and school (at which the teacher arrived by ganger's trolley, and which doubled as a community hall for dances and meetings). The Palm Tree mill was closed in 1936.

In 2007 the Crows Nest Shire Council established a 'great short walk' (about 1.5 km) in the area, and the Ravensbourne Landcare Group, with Australian Government grants in 2010 and 2011 cleared lantana and other feral weeds from the 14 acre Perservance Reserve and discovered remnants of the tramway formation in the process. Since then a number of residents formed the Munro Tramway Historical Group, and have revived the 'great short walk' and have doubled the length of the walk to 3 km. It is possible that in the future they may establish further short walks on accessible sections of the former tramway. Miva: Local historians Jennifer Nahrung and Kathy Dakin have nominated the Dick Abram Bridge as a Heritage Wonder in the Architecture/Built Environment section of the National Trust's publication to celebrate G150 in 2017. It was entered on the Queensland Heritage Register in 1992 for its role in Queensland's transport history. It is the only road/rail bridge still in use in Australia, though the last train ran in 2008. Completed in May 1886 for the Kilkivan railway, the bridge opened up an important transport route to the South Burnett. (*Gympie Times* 2 July 2016 p. 9)

Tolga – Originally known as Martin Town, Tolga was the centre of the Atherton Tablelands in the late 19th century. It became a staging post for approximately 100,000 Australian Army troops during World War II. The railway station, built in 1903, is now the museum which holds maps of the military bases in the district. (*Tablelander* 31 May 2016 p.22 including photograph)

Research Report

There has also been a request to display an image of Evelyn Harris for the Connecting Threads project on Newstead House.

A visitor to the Welsby Library has made use of the hard copies of the *Queensland Government Gazette* seeking information on Queensland's Treasury bank notes, and a couple requested images of the Chelmer, Indooroopilly area with emphasis on the opening of the Walter Taylor Bridge which proved successful for both the clients and the research team who are always delighted when their assistance is appreciated.
