There is a chamber under the cairn that contains records of Beenleigh and its people. The capsule also contains records of Beenleigh that were buried in the original time capsule in 1964.

President's Report

It gives me pleasure to welcome Michelle Pickering to the council of the Society. Michelle is the coordinator of the Brisbane Living Heritage Network and has qualifications and experience in museum and curatorial issues. We look forward to her contribution to the activities of the Society.

The Society held many significant events in recent weeks. Two weekends ago, the Commissariat Store was opened to members of the Society and guests to enjoy a pizza in a convivial environment with friends whilst watching Riverfire from the courtyard. It was a wonderful event even though numbers were down from last year, no doubt due to the difficult access made by the casino construction next door and the inclement weather.

The next event on 4 October 2017 was the launch of the *Behind the Lines* – Queensland soldiers in Naours and Vignacourt exhibition. We were all honoured to witness the interesting and informative lectures by Michael and Dianne Fiechtner and Otto Mellar the photographic conservator from Sydney. The lectures concerned the discovery of glass photographic plates in a barn at Vignacourt in France of WWI soldiers, many being Australian and the nearby signatures of soldiers written on a mediaeval cave wall in Naours. The skill and expertise of Otto Mellar who removed the images from the dirty glass plates was obvious for all to see. I thank all those volunteers who created the exhibition on the middle floor.

On 8 October a guided tour with Glenn Cooke to the exhibition *With Heart & Hand: Art Pottery in Queensland 1900–1950* held at Griffith University in Grey Street South Bank was held.

Open House was again held last weekend and despite the rain the Commissariat Store was visited by hundreds of members of the public. It was an excellent two days, and I again thank all the volunteers who gave up their time to act as guides. The monthly lecture, held on 10 October was delivered by Ros Lauder on the Yungaburra Rifle Club in 1914 and was well attended.

Jon Stanford is organising a bus trip to the Caboolture Heritage Centre on 17 November. You are all welcome to attend.

Pam Gough, well known Brisbane artist and Society member has agreed to donate her painting of the Commissariat Store to the Society. Pam's artistic work is influenced by her famous tutor William Robinson and it shows in her strong and vibrant colours of Brisbane's built architecture. Pam was inspired by Brisbane's history and heritage and city landscapes. This painting was presented to the Society on Friday evening 19 October at an exhibition of her artwork at the Graydon Gallery in New farm. We are indebted to Pamela for her generous gift.

Denver needs to be commended for his efforts concerning the project to reinvigorate the Dig Tree Reserve. He has spent an inordinate amount of time carrying this project forward. It is continuing.

Again, I wish to promote the Separation Day event to be held at the Commissariat Store on 10 December 2018 and two conferences being held in February next year. The first conference on Armistice Day, WWI and its aftermath will be held on Saturday 16 February 2019. This conference is being organised to satisfy the grant the Society has had the privilege to receive. The grant money is to be expended to publish papers on this topic and to organise a display in the museum.

Finally, the Society will partner with the ASHG to convene a conference on the history of the Stephens Shire being held on 23 February 2019 in Annerley.

Queensland News

Cooktown – Seven new interpretation signs have been erected in Cooktown's Historic Railway Park. They illustrate the water tank, engine turning pit and locomotive shed. Eighteen months of volunteer work, community and council donations of machinery works and services have helped clear the area and reveal the

remains of the Cooktown – Laura Railway. Phase two comprises plans to provide a covering over the locomotive shed and establish it as an exhibition area. Phase three involves a walking track along the line to the Racecourse and other walking paths around the station area. The local groups involved have been the Bowls Club, Medical Centre, Cooktown Chamber of Commerce and Tourism, Lions Club, Men's Shed and 'Stay Another Day'. One hundred metres of boardwalk are required at a cost of around \$45,000. The \$2,400 heavy plastic signs have come from the United Kingdom. (*Cape York News* 15-21 August 2018 p. 10)

Irvinebank – Ms Lorrain Reda of Irvinebank currently undertakes basic maintenance work in the Irvinebank Cemetery in Mareeba Shire. She has advised council of the poor state of the cemetery fencing. Recently the grave of astronomer and former medical officer of the Walsh District Hospital in Irvinebank, William McFarlane was visited by Australian astronomers celebrating the significance of McFarlane's work in Irvinebank in discovering the Vulcan Star (named after a local tin mine, the deepest in Australia). Atherton State High School is undertaking an Online College of Advanced Science Technology Engineering and Mathematics project observing the Vulcan Star officially known as Nova Aquilae. Dr McFarlane discovered the star on 8 June 1918. McFarlane died on 17 August 1919 aged 53 years. A plaque was placed on McFarlane's grave by astronomer, Dr Graeme White of Wagga Wagga, and Atherton State High School teacher, David Platz, to acknowledge his important contribution to astronomy. Karumba – A Barramundi Discovery Centre is being opened to the public in the near future providing insights into the fishing industry over time. (*Tablelander* 21 August 2018 p. 23)

Moura – Moura people remembered the three underground mine disasters in August. The last was on 7 August 1994 when 11 men died in No 2 mine. Earlier mine disasters were on 16 July 1968 in No 4 mine when 12 men died. On 20 September 1975, 13 men died. The bodies of the miners were recovered after the first disaster only. (*Central Telegraph* 10 August 2018 p. 7 including two photographs)

Normanton – The town recently celebrated its 150 years anniversary as a regional town. It is the centre of the Carpentaria Shire. Burns Philp Pty Ltd operated a general store and shipping service for many decades. Today the town is known more for the Gulflander train and the Purple Pub. (*Tablelander* 21 August 2018 p. 23)

Fellowship

The Society's Council recommends that Ms Carolyn Nolan be awarded a Fellowship under Rule 35 (d) of the Constitution, for her research and historical writing. Carolyn was President of the Society from 2009 to 2012 and was also awarded a Centenary Medal in 2013. Carolyn has written extensively on Queensland history – Stuartholme School, AP Eagers Motor Company, Alex Gow Funeral Directors, Charltons Stockbroking, Lawn Bowls in Queensland, and Brisbane's Historic North Bank. Carolyn presented the Clem Lack Oration in 2016 on the Hamilton Suburb and was also chair of the Program Committee for several years.

Carolyn Nolan is Brisbane-born and a graduate of the University of Queensland (BA Hons English). She worked in reference at the John Oxley Library and was encouraged by the then John Oxley Librarian, Mamie O'Keeffe, to join RHSQ and has been a member since 1974. At State Library Carolyn did further reference work, then with the start of the History Research Service, having completed the 75 year history of Stuartholme School (1995), she wrote commissioned histories of Queensland firms, houses, towns, rural properties and far western shires, until 2006.

She was invited to work at the Brisbane Archdiocesan Archives in July 2006, where she assists the Archivist. As a private historian she has completed further histories, including the centenary history of AP Eagers Ltd (2013).

Carolyn is a Past President of RHSQ and delivered the Clem Lack Oration for 2017.

MacGregor Medal:

The Society's Council recommends that Dr Graeme be awarded a MacGregor Medal under Rule 35 (f) of the Constitution, for his editing of the *Bulletin* for 11 years and contribution to the Society's museum in a variety of ways. Graeme joined the Society in September 2007. He began editing the Society's *Bulletin* in December 2007. His first *Bulletin* was February 2008 (No 716) and is now up to No 835. He has completed 82 projects for the Society, comprising building jobs such as the Book Display Cases in the foyer; upgrading the medal collection; building easels; cleaning and polishing of the HMAS *Brisbane* bell; and making display boxes, making photograph frames, photo stands, making a flag hanger, a bedspread stand, and the Perspex box that is placed on the table for the lunch money at the talks. He has also given several talks, one in particular for the Governor when he discussed the Society's medal collection.

The Talk for November Wednesday 14 November Speaker: Mark Whitmore

Topic: 'All Aboard for the Western Front'

Railways were of unprecedented importance throughout WW1. The nature of the conflict was largely shaped by the ability of railways to support rapid, mass mobilisation of armies on the continent, and then to maintain the huge volumes of supplies of all types needed to maintain them in the field. As the war dragged on into 1916, the railways in France and Belgium struggled to keep up with the demands of the British forces. One strategy for dealing with this problem was an appeal to the Australian Government to recruit experienced railway men. Ultimately six Australian railway operating companies were raised, with the 4th Australian Broad Gauge Railway Operating Company being largely recruited in Queensland. In March 1918 this Company were almost over-run by the huge German spring offensive, but showed great initiative in withdrawing their locomotives and other equipment under sometimes intense artillery and machine-gun fire. They were subsequently based in Dunkerque, where bombing and long range shelling frequently disrupted operations. This presentation will talk about their experiences and will also look at what can be seen today along the lines that they operated. If anyone has any private diaries, letters or photographs relating to these men, the author would be very interested to hear of them.

Mark Whitmore. Mark was formerly a Senior Curator at the Queensland Museum, where he wrote a book on Mephisto in 1989. He subsequently worked at the Australian War Memorial and retired as Director of Collections and Research at the Imperial War Museum in the UK in 2015, but continues with historical research and museum consultancy work. He is currently writing a book on the Australian Railway Operating Companies in WW1.

Distinguished Scholar Award

Dr William (Bill) Metcalf, of Griffith University and University of Queensland, received the *Distinguished Scholar Award* at the recent conference of the *Communal Studies Association* in Illinois, USA. According to the citation, "This award honors those persons who have contributed greatly to the scholarly study of communal societies, both past and present".
