

President's Report

Welcome back to members, volunteers and councillors. I hope you have had a relaxing and pleasurable Christmas and New Year's break and are ready for a busy 2020 year.

I would like to acknowledge everyone who contributed to the very successful separation day function held on 10 December 2019. Again, it was an excellent function. Ralph Devlin AM QC gave a cameo address on the history of Life saving in Queensland in the presence of his Excellency Paul de Jersey AC, the Governor of Queensland and Mrs Kaye de Jersey. The Society held a primary school competition where children were encouraged to present a piece of art, a poem or an essay to celebrate 110 years of surf life-saving in Queensland. His Excellency presented the winners awards at the function.

This year will be very busy. The regular Council and Committee meetings will continue to be held each month. On 15 February a strategy meeting will be held to consider the issues surrounding the question of what the Society will look like after the new casino is opened in 2023. All interested persons are invited to attend this important management event. We hope to have enough human traffic to sustain being opened seven days a week.

All the work to be undertaken at the Dig Tree has been approved and all preliminary steps have been completed. The work will be carried out by the Bulloo Shire Council as soon as they are able.

The three conferences to commemorate Cook's journey up the east coast in 1770 will be held. All the speakers and venues have been organized. Considerable energy has been spent organizing these conferences and brochures have or are being prepared. The conferences will be held at:

- 1. The State Library in Brisbane on 23 May 2020.
- 2. The Sandcastles 1770 Motel and Resort, 40 Captain Cook Drive, Agnes Water on 29 May 2020.
- 3. The PCYC in Cooktown on 1 August 2020.

The monthly lunch time lectures will be continuing from February 2020. The first lecture is presented by Jane Smith, speaking on the ship *The Emigrant*. I look forward to seeing you at these lectures. The details of the programme for the year are noted elsewhere in this *Bulletin*.

A conference is being convened at Parliament House on 25 July 2020 to commemorate the centenary of the death of Sir Samuel Griffith, GCMG, PC, KC. He was a two term Queensland Premier, Chief Justice of Queensland and the first Chief Justice of the High Court. This conference is being convened jointly with the Parliamentary Library. Also, our annual conference will be held later in the year at the Commissariat Store.

Finally, our annual dinner will be held on Queensland Day, 6 June 2020 with the presentation of the John and Ruth Kerr Medal of Distinction. Again, we will celebrate separation day on 10 December 2020.

Talk for February Topic: The *Emigrant*: The Ship of Death Speaker: Jane Smith February 12, 12:30 pm - 1:30 pm Outline of Topic:

The *Emigrant* sailed into Moreton Bay in August 1850 after four terrible months at sea. It was the second government-assisted immigrant ship to come directly to Moreton Bay in a scheme that aimed to boost the growth of free Brisbane and remove the stains of its convict past. Some 276 poor settlers from England and Ireland boarded the ship in Plymouth, hoping to build a better life in Australia. Typhus and other maladies killed around twenty on the voyage, and the ship was therefore diverted on arrival to the newly proclaimed quarantine station at Dunwich. Conditions on the island were appalling; dilapidated buildings remaining from convict days and leaky tents provided the only shelter. A hellish three-month quarantine followed, during which two of the three doctors and twenty-six immigrants died, including a young woman who committed suicide and a boy who perished in a fire.

Jane Smith's book *Ship of Death* and her website tell these stories against the backdrop of early Queensland history: a time when a government-sponsored immigration boom was shaping Australian society. In her address to the RHSQ she would like to share some of her findings. Jane Smith pays tribute to the doctors, the captain and the passengers, describes the ghastly conditions of the voyage and quarantine, and reveals the fate of some of the emigrant's more colourful characters, bringing to life a journey that was common to many of Australia's early settlers.

The Speaker:

Jane Smith is a Toowoomba librarian, author, freelance editor and former physiotherapist who enjoys researching and writing about history – fiction and non-fiction, for children and for adults. Jane has written a series of five children's non-fiction books about bushrangers, a biography of Captain Starlight (for adults) and the first eight episodes of the children's historical fiction series, 'Tommy Bell, Bushranger Boy' – all published by Big Sky Publishing.

Chamber Concert by Karlsruher Konzertduo 25 February, 6:30pm to 8pm Entry Fee: \$30

Enjoy the music of Beethoven, Mendelssohn, Schumann, Liszt, Ravel and de Falla on a summer night! Cool down with some complimentary drinks before the concert. There will be no intermission.

The Karlsruhe Concert-Duo with cellist Reinhard Armleder and pianist Dagmar Hartmann has been in existence since 1999 and has established itself as a successful and sought-after duo in Germany and abroad, not least through winning several international competitions. The duo regularly earns high praise and fascinates its audiences with profound and captivating interpretations, brilliant technique, and imaginative programming.

In their repertoire, the two musicians concentrate on classical-romantic literature and 20th century music. For their ensemble they are particularly interested in the rediscovery of lesser known composers and works, but they also dedicate themselves time and again to the music of the modern age and bring works dedicated to the present to their world premieres.

The two artists studied at the Staatliche Hochschule für Musik in Karlsruhe, Trossingen and Berlin. As a duo, they have won first prize at various international competitions such as the Lorenzo Perosi Competition in Biella (1999), in Moncalieri (1999), and at the Racconigi Competition (2001). In France, the Karlsruher Konzert-Duo won the Concours Pierre Lantier in Paris (2000) and the U.A.F.M. competition in Chaville (2003). Their success in these competitions brought the two musicians a great deal of attention and opened up engagements on national and international podiums, setting the stage for concerts worldwide.

Today their concert calendar includes regular tours throughout Europe, as well as to North, Central and South America, the Middle East, Asia, and countries of southern Africa. To date the duo has traveled to 70 countries and has been celebrated at renowned national and international festivals such as Beethoven Music Society Washington/USA, Schubert Society London/Great Britain, Festival de Musique au Château de

Bourglinster/Luxembourg, Art-November Festival in Moscow/Russia, Haifa Music Festival/Israel, Johannesburg International Mozart Festival/South Africa, Rovinj International Music Festival/Croatia, Concert Series Museu de Arte de São Paulo/Brazil, Friends of Jordan Festival Amman/Jordan, Barenboim-Said-Foundation Ramallah/Palestine or Bir Miftuh International Music Festival/Malta.

The concert duo's creative works have been documented in numerous radio and television productions as well as on CDs recorded under the Fiori Classics label.

Reinhard Armleder and Dagmar Hartmann are committed to the training and promotion of young musicians. In addition to their work as lecturers at the University of Music/Karlsruhe and the Conservatory of Baden/Karlsruhe, they regularly give master classes at home and abroad.

A popular tourist destination for school students, families & seniors tours, the Beenleigh Historical Village features early Australia memorabilia, collections of items and even entire buildings which have been lovingly preserved and restored. We're also a favourite location for car and bike clubs, and special functions such as weddings.

There are twenty heritage buildings filled with original items used by those who lived in the 1860s and onward. Our extensive collection has been either donated to the Village or were the original products/items belonging in the homes we have on site.

You can see the old St. George Anglican Church, The Beenleigh Council Chambers, Willkie's General Store, the old Dodge fire engines, family homes, the Loganholme One Teacher School, the Post Office and much more.
