

HMQS PALUMA FIRST OF SEVERAL AUSTRALIAN NAVY SHIPS WITH THIS NAME

Paluma and her sister ship *Gayundah* were the first vessels ordered by the Queensland government for the Queensland Maritime Defence Force. Their names are aboriginal words for 'thunder' and 'lightning' respectively. Built at a cost of £35,000 each, the vessels were of a 'flat-iron' design and mounted a formidable armament for their size. Both ships carried out trials on 26 September 1884 and reached a speed slightly over 10.5 knots in full power trials over a ten mile course.

An agreement had previously been reached between the British Admiralty and the Queensland government for the Admiralty to fit out and employ *Paluma* for survey work in northern Australian waters. This was announced by the Admiralty on 28 July 1884. Consequently, following *Paluma*'s trials, her main deck armament was removed and replaced by facilities for the surveyors, a deckhouse on the quarterdeck replacing the 6-inch gun and a work room forward replacing the 8-inch gun.

Paluma commissioned in the Royal Navy on 28 October 1884 under the command of Lieutenant George E Richards, RN. She reached Brisbane on 7 May 1885. For the next ten years, *Paluma* was engaged charting the waters of northern Australia, primarily within the Great Barrier Reef.

In 1893, *Paluma*, then under the command of Captain Pirie, RN, and undergoing refit between surveys was left high and dry in the Botanical Gardens by the great floods of that year. She was eventually refloated when a second flood enabled the government steamer *Advance* to haul her into the water. Fortunately *Paluma* had sustained no significant damage.

In March 1895, *Paluma*, having completed her term of survey duty with the Royal Navy, finally passed to the control of the Queensland government. She was immediately paid off, leaving only a care and maintenance party on board, but did provide training as required for Queensland Naval Brigade. The ship continued in her training role as a unit of the Australian Navy following Federation in 1901 and remained serving, mainly on harbour duties, until 1916.

Paluma was sold to the Victorian Ports and Harbours Department in 1916 and renamed *Rip*. She served until 1949, employed as a lighthouse tender and on carrying out a continuous program of blasting operations at the entrance to Port Phillip. She was finally broken up at Melbourne in 1950-51. Her place was taken by another *Rip*, the former HMAS *Whyalla* (I)

Queensland Report

Ayr – On 3 September 2021 the Department of Environment and Science received an application proposing entry of the Lower Burdekin Masonic Temple, 118-120 Macmillan Street, Ayr in the Queensland Heritage Register as a State Heritage Place.

Cooroy – A detailed description of the operation of the Wide Bay Co-operative Dairy Association butter factory at Cooroy from 1915 to 1975 and a brief history is provided in the *Cooroy Rag* of 6 October 2021. The first factory, a timber building, opened in 1915 and the current brick building dates from 1930. Buttermilk was supplied to a farmer in Jarrah Street via a two-inch pipe. A wood fired steam boiler powered the factory until electricity was installed in the 1960s. The butter was labelled 'Golden Bush'. It was transported by train in a cold wagon to the Butter Board in Brisbane for export. The factory had its own water supply from a well. Other wells in Cooroy were at Wimmers' Soft Drink Factory, Cooroy Motors Garage (for cleaning the building and supplying the Harry Spring's nearby pharmacy) and Oak Bonnell's house (used in the dry months to supply the town with water). Eumundi – The heritage listed *Joe's Waterhole* Hotel has been purchased by Western Australian brewing company, Matsos for \$5.3 million. It received its current name in 1987, named after Joe Whiting. Joe and Lucy Whiting sold a cane farm to purchase the hotel in 1962. Joe Whiting suffered an accident rendering him quadriplegic in the early 1980s. His son, Ray managed the hotel until the sale in 2005 to Brett Lewis. Matsos plan to retain the front bar but to establish an outside beer garden and a small brewery at the rear. (*Your Local Lifestyle* {Sunshine Coast}, October 2021, p. 19)

Rochedale South - In the 1950s this area was featured in the suburban newspaper, *My City Logan*, on 14 September 2021. The area comprised many small farms – small crops, fruit trees, pineapples, cattle, pigs and sheep. Families built their own homes including utilising old army huts. Logan City Council through its RADF program published an e-book on the area. (*My City Logan*, 28 September – 4 October 2021, p. 10)

Toowoomba – The Toowoomba Regional Council is advocating a \$65 million Toowoomba Railway Parklands project in the list of projects in the upcoming Southeast Queensland City Deal being negotiated between the local, state and federal governments. Toowoomba's 8.6 hectare historic railway yards will be the centrepiece of the development which was first suggested by the Toowoomba Chamber of Commerce in the 1990s. Ration Shed Museum, Cherbourg by Lesley Synge

In October I visited the Barambah/Cherbourg Historical Precinct to take a guided tour with respected Waka Waka Elder Uncle Eric Law. Our starting place was the former ration shed, a memorial to the Aboriginal inmates who'd experienced removal from locations throughout Queensland from 1905. Unable to continue a traditional hunting and gathering lifestyle, they were provided with rations. Other buildings such as the Boys Dormitory and the Superintendent's Office also housed eye-opening exhibitions. Our tour group found

ourselves moved as we witnessed the heartbreak that came with removal, and gobsmacked as we learnt of stunning achievements in sport, war service and art.

Ration Shed Museum is professionally curated and very informative. Managed by the Cherbourg Aboriginal Shire Council, it is an easy 90 km drive west from Gympie. Check Opening Hours and Fees before visiting. <u>http://cherbourgmemory.org/</u>

Fellowship

The Society's Council recommends that Mr Stephen Sheaffe AM be awarded a Fellowship under Rule 35 (d) of the Constitution, for his significant scholarly achievements in Queensland history and the community including this Society.

Mr Stephen Sheaffe is a barrister who has been a member of the Society's Council since 1992. He has brought organisational skills and research and publication abilities to the Society and has been President of the Society twice. He has published nine books on family history with several being highly commended by family history organisations. Stephen presented his first historical paper to the Society at the 1991 conference and has since published several articles in *Queensland History Journal*. He has analysed the criminal trials of Dundalli and the Kenniff brothers, studied in detail the case of Patrick Mayne (of the Mayne Inheritance) and also the death

of the surveyor, Stapleton who died when surveying in the McPherson Ranges, and has had historical papers published on these topics. Stephen has promoted and organised conferences for the Annerley-Stephens Historical Society, presented historical papers there and edited and published the conference papers.

MacGregor Medal:

The Society's Council recommends that Dr Rebecca Ling be awarded a MacGregor Medal under Rule 35 (f) of the Constitution, for her role in the Society as Grants Co-ordinator and member of Council. Dr Rebecca Ling was appointed a Special Project Officer in 2008 and has been a member of Council since 2012. Rebecca has been Grants Co-ordinator for the whole period. This involves diligent research and preparation of grant applications to grant authorities to support the exhibition and conservation of the Society's collections and improvements in the Society's administrative operations. The role also includes the oversight and acquittal of all the grants. Rebecca's wise counsel in meetings has been of the highest standard.

Library and Research Report

The Library and Research team is delighted to see the new server and upgraded software for all our online services now installed. Apart from stabilizing the library catalogue and ensuring access to all the individual items it lists, this means that all digitized documents and photos, previously stored on external devices, are now on the main drive and thus easily accessed. We are also benefitting from a much faster operating system, a new desktop computer and laptop. Welcome to new volunteer Graham and welcome back to Dorothy. Graham has started listing and digitizing the contents of the Family Files, one section of the nearly 10,000 Subject, Family and District Files held in the Library. Dorothy continues to assess the numerous Files created by member David Brownsey dealing largely with recent Kelvin Grove history. Tim is in the process

of digitizing the loose pages collected from the Townsville-based Cummins & Campbell magazine, while Peter is photographing selected photos from *The Week*, prior to the hard copies of this newspaper being moved to storage. Liz has been exploring conservation options for the library's badly-degraded hard copies of Pugh's Almanac 1859- 1926.

Research queries received to date were: Queensland factory making Wallaby steel plates for quad skates; sandstone quarries around Brisbane; creeks near the Burdekin River as source of fresh water for sailing ships; Australian Joint Stock Bank Brisbane branch history and photo; Governor George Bowen and the Queensland Legislative Council; the Petrie Tableau sculpture in King George Square, Brisbane; Journal articles on French explorer Nicholas Baudin; photo of Newstead House exterior.

The library has been offered historical papers relating to Virginia State School, as well as items relating to railway and signaling equipment manufactured by Northgate firm, McKenzie & Holland. Arising from a research request, we contacted the Community and Personal History Unit at the Queensland State Archives to discuss their services. The unit has a comprehensive coverage of government, community and personal records relating mainly to indigenous peoples of Queensland. Now these records can be available to non-indigenous researchers on a case-by-case basis. As a matter of course, the Library refers all enquiries relating to Indigenous history to the QSA service. There is also a smaller but just as helpful service located at the State Library of Queensland.

Finally, the Library and Research team is engaged in a revue of the overall library policy and, given the uncertain nature of our volunteer base, is devising an operational plan to cover the foreseeable future.
