RUDD'S PUB



Rudd's Pub at Nobby

Nobby is a town 30 km south of Toowoomba. The origin of the name is unknown, but when the railway from Toowoomba to Hendon was being built, the locality was known as the McDonald Camp. Later the name became Nobby and despite a temporary official renaming as Davenport, the previous name was reinstated in 1931. Rudd's Pub was built in 1893 and was originally called the "Davenporter" hotel. The name was changed to Rudd's Pub in the 1980's in recognition of the author Steele Rudd (real name Arthur Hoey Davis).

The hotel itself is quite unique and still retains the character and charm of a hotel from a bygone era. The walls tell a photographic story of days gone by and memorabilia covers the walls and the ceiling. Steele Rudd lived in Nobby for a short of time and folklore says that he used to sit in front of the fire place in the Heritage room of the pub and write some of his stories.

Publicans, Evan and Gayle Jones invite everyone to visit this historic building and part take of the hospitality of the pub and view the many interesting sites in the Nobby area.

Queensland Report

Beenleigh – The Heck homestead, named 'Friedensheim' meaning 'House of Peace', was officially opened at the Beenleigh Historic Village and Museum in November 2021. It was built for Wilhelm and Ida

Heck in 1914, the second generation of the Heck family, the first of whom migrated from Germany in 1866. It overlooked the Rocky Point Sugar Mill. The house was removed to the Beenleigh Historic Village in July 2018. At the opening Bill and Pat Heck expressed many anecdotes about living in the house. The house had not been lived in since the 1970s, but had been used for company meetings, family gatherings and charity events. East Ipswich – A new railway station is being built at a cost of \$35 million at East Ipswich. The timber footbridge built in the 1960s and the old station building built in 1956 have been demolished. The only building deemed of heritage value to Queensland Rail is the timber platform shelter shed which was re-assembled in October 2022 adjacent to the new station. The station was known as Limestone from its opening in 1879 until 1892. Ipswich – News Corporation left behind the early linotype type-setting machine displayed outside the former *Queensland Times* building on Brisbane Street when they closed the last part of their operations in the West Ipswich building. The building owners have offered the machine to the Ipswich Historical Society. Hugh Taylor, president of the Society has asked business owners for assistance in moving it. The Ipswich Historical Society has approached the Ipswich City Council with an option to relocate it to near the original *Queensland Times* building in the garden area opposite the proposed cinema on the corner of Brisbane and Ellenborough Streets, Ipswich, as a streetscape project. In 1903 the *Queensland Times* became the first provincial newspaper office in Queensland to use type-setting machines, but initially they used the Canadian monoline. One machine would set more than six times as much type in an hour as a hand-setter could. Ten years later the paper installed eight linotype machines, manufactured in New York. The linotype was seen as 'a great advance on the monoline'. The machine that is part of the current proposed streetscape project is one of those eight linotypes. News Corp ceased printing the *Queensland Times*, first issued on 8 October 1861 and a daily since October 1908, in June 2020. Tarome - On 22 November 2021 the Department of Environment and Science received an application proposing entry of the Allan Cunningham Monument, Cunningham Highway between Ipswich and Warwick, Cunningham's Gap, Tarome in the Queensland Heritage Register as a State Heritage Place. Templin near Boonah – The Templin Museum was given the chair, bench and light from the Boonah Freemasons Lodge in 2020. The Museum has an official photograph of Templin school's headmaster who was the inaugural Grand Master of the Lodge. Very recently the record books of the Lodge were donated to the Museum. (*Beaudesert Times*, 17 November 2021, p. 12)


Templin Historical Village Museum is comprised of numerous buildings showcasing local memorabilia and artifacts. The collection covers farming history, war memorabilia, cameras, 1900s fashion, medical memorabilia, and more.

The village, once the Templin State School, closed in 1970 when the number of enrollments declined. Ownership was handed over to Boonah Shire Council and taken care of by the local historical society.

The original school building and playshed have been added to over the years, including a slab hut from the 1870s occupied by a family of nine, and a church from Cannon Creek built in the 1910s for 75 pounds. A dairy features an early separator and butter boxes.

Some large farming items in the collection are outside the buildings, such as trackers, log snigs, and a windmill.

Yuleba – A photograph of the Cobb and Co coach in front of the Yuleba store in 1922 is featured in the *The Chronicle* (Toowoomba) on 20 November 2021 on page 54. The photograph is from the State Library of Queensland Collection.

Library and Research Report

Best wishes to all for 2022. Our services recommenced in mid-January on a restricted basis and with fewer volunteers available. We are sorry to say goodbye to Liz Wilkinson who has accepted a 6-months intern position with the Queensland State Archives. If the record of previous volunteers who have taken a similar

path is anything to go by, we are sure the position will become a permanent one. With her archival and administration background and a high level of enthusiasm, Liz made a significant contribution to our operations. Most notably, she compiled a guide for the best-practice handling and conservation of a range of Library holdings and an easy-to-use guide to accessing the Library's digital files, and prepared a comprehensive plan for future conservation projects.

Since December, the following research enquiries have been received: early gold-mining in the Brisbane area; information, documentation and resources regarding Queensland's Legislative Council and its 'abolishment'; the inspiration for the Castlemaine XXXX Brewery mascot "Mr Fourex"; the location in Eight Mile Plains of the residence of Walter Hill, one-time curator of the Brisbane Botanical Gardens; any information on a Madame Horton who advertised as a clairvoyant in Brisbane between 1912 and 1917; historical land use information re potential contamination of a Brisbane site; and who was responsible for naming Brisbane suburb Tennyson and its streets after the Arthurian legend. There was a request to use photos from the RHSQ collection in an upcoming publication on Queensland forestry history. Surveyor George Phillips' field notebooks and correspondence were retrieved from the Library archives for a visiting researcher.

In addition to on-going projects such as digitization of photos and documents, and upgrading of the Library catalogue, we will be working on the preservation of 'Captain Wood's Cutting Book.' Now in very poor condition, this is a huge, unwieldy volume. The late Dr Rod Fisher did some research based on the cutting book but otherwise little is currently known about Captain Wood. From a preliminary inspection, it appears that newspaper cuttings take up only a small part. The remainder is comprised of ephemera, photos and often lengthy hand-written letters, some of them relating to World War One. A comprehensive report on the contents and progress of the preservation work will be presented in due course.
