In front of the shop is a steel-wheeled tractor hauling a wagon with a 1½ ton cheddar cheese that was being transported to the railway station for despatch to London for the World Dairy Show, 1923. According to *The Register* (Adelaide) of 25<sup>th</sup> October, 1923, reporting on a number of cheese categories, the Kingston (South-East Queensland) Factory won a third prize, but Pittsworth missed out.

### **Queensland Report**

Boonah has Clydebuilt as a modern landmark which celebrates the agricultural history of the area. It is fine art in heavy metal at the entry to the Boonah retail area. It has been created by Andrew Scott who came to Boonah in 2004 from Scotland. He built Boonah's heavy horse heritage in the repurposed open sided boiler room of the old Boonah butter factory. Clydebuilt was purchased by the Boonah community for \$20,000. The local Rural Economic Development Institute raised \$5,000 by public donations and contributed \$15,000 from its own funds. The Department of Transport and Main Roads agreed to allow Clydebuilt to stand on its property at the entry to the town. Boonah Shire Council donated the earthworks and lighting and the Institute organised the sandstone blocks from Helidon quarry. Clydebuilt remains in the ownership of a community organisation and was dedicated to local Clydesdale breeders, Pat and Colin Ehrich at Kulgun near Boonah. One of the early Clydesdale studs in Queensland, AW1, was established by Arthur Weinholt at Maryvale and Fassifern stations.

Almost a decade later Andrew Scott won the commission to sculpt the focal point of the \$40 million The Helix ecopark project beside the canal

link between the Forth and the Clyde canals near Falkirk in Scotland. The work was funded by Scottish Canals, and Kelpies were to represent the shape shifting aquatic spirit of legend which often took the shape of a horse. The Kelpies were also to represent the more modern canal heritage where Clydesdales were used to pull the barges along the canals and work the land. **Mount Garnet** – *The Australian Financial Review* of 6-7 August 222 included a photograph on page 40 of an Afghan cameleer, Abdul Wade, beside a bull camel. It was included in the recently published book, *The Ballad of Abdul Wade*, by Ryan Butta. My research has indicated that the photograph was taken at Mount Garnet in 1900 before the railway opened to the town, and its smelters which opened on 15 January 1901. His camels plied between Lappa on the Chillagoe Railway and Mount Garnet until the railway opened on 3 April 1902. He had strong connections with pastoral companies and his camels also transported wool in Victoria and New South Wales, copper at Cobar and silver and lead at Broken Hill. He was also involved in introducing

traction engines to cart copper matte from OK to Mungana, the railhead of the Mareeba to Chillagoe railway. Wade's career was a mysterious one and he met with WS Robinson, a director of BHP, in London in 1924. Noosa Shire Banana Industry – August 2022 was the centenary of when the Noosa Shire was the top banana producing area in Queensland when the area was producing 25% of the state's production. At the time the Tweed Valley banana industry was decimated by banana bunchy top virus. Between 1918 and 1922 Noosa Shire and parts of Widgee Shire and Gympie Town area the banana production grew from 12.9% to 25.6% of Queensland production. Bananas were first grown in the Gympie area at Goomboorian in 1908 and at the Maroonda Experimental Station at Amamoor in 1913. The Gympie and District Fruitgrowers Association was formed in 1916. Many growers leased land from farmers and both prospered quickly. Banana case mills were established as required in the districts. The product was sent by train to Brisbane to market. Kin Fruit growers farmers won prizes at the Gympie and Brisbane shows in 1917. Banana growing boomed in the Cooroy district in the 1920s. Banana plantations, case mills, packing sheds and migrant group settlements dotted the landscape. There were Chinese, Indian and Sri Lankan growers. Old Ceylon Road at West Cooroy is named after the Sri Lankans who lived and worked in the area. The Pomona district had a similar history. In 1926 approx 15,000 cases of bananas were railed from Pomona to Brisbane. That year the banana industry was valued at \$1 million in Queensland. By 1932 the industry had declined markedly as the Tweed River banana industry was reinvigorated and the great depression forced farmers out of the industry. # Library and Research Report

This month, the following research enquiries were received: photos of an old timber display case of sea shells and a bird of paradise centrepiece that rested on top. This request was forwarded to the Museum Team for further information; copy of Thomas Welsby's *Discoverers of Brisbane*; Queensland Parliamentary Papers 1877 (Votes and Proceedings); information on Gordon Mackenzie, author of *Fossil Downs: A Saga of the Kimberleys*; record of a person who possibly worked at the Commissariat Store in the late 1830s; information on Aboriginal cultures and the cultural interface with colonists pre-1900, as well as architecture plans for the School of Arts building and for its reconstruction by FDG Stanley for the Queensland National Bank. Donations: Lesley Synge has donated a copy of *Meet Me at the Café; The Story behind the cafes of Gladstone 1900-1970* by Gladstone historian Paulette Flint. It joins a welcome national trend to explore the social and family history behind an enduring institution. That is the café run by families, often of Greek origin, found in most Australian towns and often taken for granted. We have been offered a selection of old newspapers and magazines including *Walkabout* 1955-58, and a souvenir book of the visit to Brisbane of the Duke of Gloucester in 1934. Warren Wagner has donated a framed copy of a coloured sketch of Captain Coley's house, late 1830s.

With the assistance of Dr. Ian Hadwen, the Library and Research Committee has finalised a priority list of books for conservation as a first step in this process. Volunteer Bo has recently completed the digitisation of over 500 photographs to add to the collection. These are photos for which the library already holds a hard copy.

## **Mystery Solved**

Thanks to Michael Brumby for finding the newspaper article reproduced here. It solved the mystery of the following photo which appeared in a monthly *Bulletin* some time ago. It was from the RHSQ collection but, apart from the description written on the photo, had no other information about date, location or even the story behind the demonstration.

Mining Stretcher (Morning Post (Cairns) 22.08.1907, p.3.)

A mining stretcher arrived from Charters Towers for the local Ambulance Brigade. The stretcher is of peculiar structure, and is intended for bringing injured men up from the depths of the mines. The patient is placed-on a stretcher in something like a straight jacket, and is strapped across the legs in various parts, the stretcher being hoisted in an erect position. The stretcher has been found to be of the greatest benefit in getting injured men from the mines; the shaking incidental upon lifting them into the cage being avoided. Yesterday, the Ambulance Superintendent (Mr. M. J. Hogan) and Mr Rheuben, a honorary member of the staff left by train for the West, it being the intention to exhibit the Stretcher on various mining fields, and give demonstrations in first aid. It is also proposed to have the stretcher on exhibition at Mareeba on Saturday next at the annual excursion.
